Hartland, N. B., July 16.—What is known as Father Coughlin's picnic at Bath took place on Tuesday and was a great success. 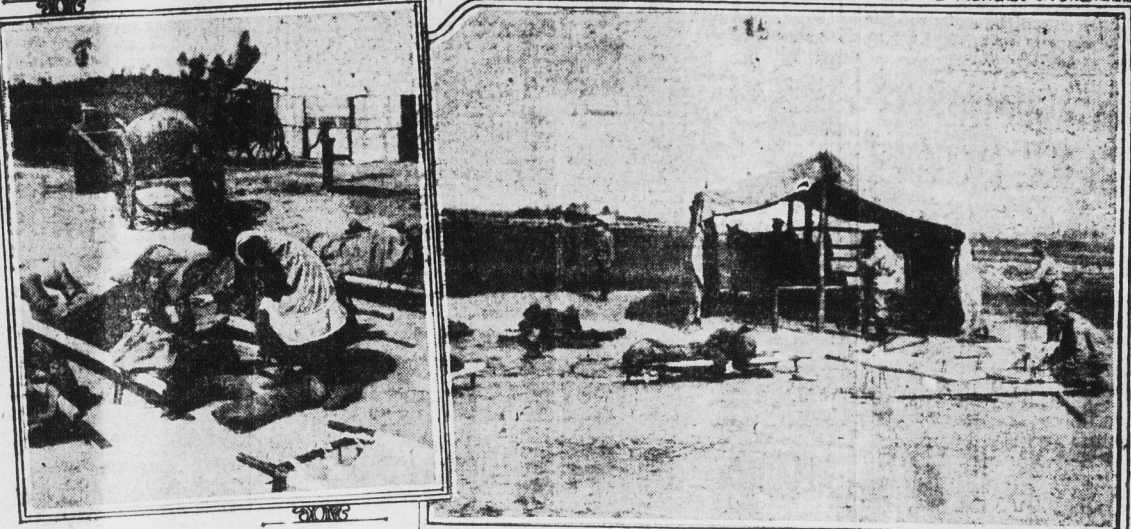

Just as the Germans used asphyxiating gases against the Allies in their struggle to reach Calais, they made use of their bombs against the Russian soldiers in an attempt to break through to Warsaw, and, according to a correspondent, it was not a pleasant sight watching the men choking for air. The above pictures taken especially for this newspaper, the New York Herald and the London Sphere, show some of the pathetic scenes witnessed after the action. In one of the pictures a little Polish girl is giving water to one of the "gassed" men. This particular soldier was holding in his right hand a piece of cotton, which had been dipped in a soothing chemical. He sniffed at it from time to time.
