A Rice Pudding

The secret of creamy and tasty poor man's rice pudding, which at its best is worthy a higher sounding title, is a minimum of rice, plenty of creamy milk, slow baking, and frequent stirring. A woman who is an adept at the pudding uses a tablespoonful of rice to a quart of milk, four table-spoonfuls of sugar and a little salt. The pudding is baked slowly for fully three hours, and every time a brown scale forms on the top, it is stirred in. The brown substance is what gives the distinctive color and taste to the dish.

Apple and Orange Pudding

Six apples, the juice of four oranges and one lemon, three ounces bread or cake crumbs rubbed through sieve. Five ounces loaf sugar (rubbed on the side of the loaf) dissolved in juice of one lemon. Yolk of three or four eggs, whites of same. Line a pie dish (which is to be full of mixture) with short paste, covering the edges thickly. Sift the apples till quite soft with sugar. Add to them the strained juice of the fruit and a little salt. When one drop in the yolks, beating well each time. Place the mixture in the center of the dish till quite full. Bake till paste is firm. Whip the whites of egg to a very stiff froth with a little castor sugar. Heat them up on the center and place the pudding before the fire till the eggs are quite set and golden brown.

Orange Cream

Dissolve five leaves of white leaf gelatine in a large teacupful of strained and sweetened orange juice. To do this, warm the orange juice, tear the gelatine into small pieces and stir until dissolved, just keeping the mixture warm meanwhile. Whip 1/2 pint of double cream to a fairly stiff froth and then add the stiffened fruit juice little by little. It should be cool but still quite liquid. Then whip together. Have ready a soufflé dish and fill it with the mixture, smoothing the top.

Queen's Pudding

Ingredients—One quarter lb. bread crumbs, one-half pint milk, 1/2 lemon one-quarter lb. castor sugar, one and one-half ounces butter, two eggs, jam. Method—Ball rind of lemon in milk with sugar and pour over the bread crumbs. When well soaked, take out the peel, stir in the butter and yolks of eggs one at a time, then put egg of jam in a pie dish and above mixture on top, then bake for half an hour. When cooked, whip up whites of eggs stiffly, add two ounces of castor sugar, and some essence of lemon; put this on the top to set. It may be eaten cold. This pudding should cook slowly.

Marmalade Custards

Ingredients—One quarter lb. short crust, one lb. marmalade, one ounce butter, one-half ounce castor sugar, one egg, one tablespoonful milk, one-half ounce cornstarch. Method—Line some party tins with short crust. Cream butter and sugar, then add yolk of egg, and beat in well, then cornstarch, milk and marmalade. Mix well, and put about a tablespoonful into each party tin. Bake in a moderate oven about a quarter of an hour. Whip the white of egg to a stiff froth, add one ounce castor sugar, and place it on top of the baked custards. Return to the oven to set.

Rice and Apple Compote

Rice and apple compote makes a nice savory dessert. Peel and core the apples, and fill the centres with minced raisins and citron. Put the apples in a baking dish, fill around them with hot boiled rice and bake covered for a quarter of an hour and uncovered for the same time. Serve with rich cream.

A Breakfast Dish

An excellent breakfast dish is baked apples with figs or dates. Core the apples, fill the holes with chopped figs or dates, packed in tightly, sprinkle with powdered sugar and baste often with butter, lemon juice and hot water. Serve separately or with cream.
