MR. DYNE PLAYING POLITICS?

Starts a Near Row in Legislature by Objecting to St. John County Bill, Although His Own Bathurst Can Get By.

Fredericton, May 18.—The House met at 3 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Burchill presented the report of the committee on standing rules, adding that he was desired by the committee to bring before the House again the question of the bills which were referred back to the committee. There were three of these bills, one relating to the city of St. John, one to the city of Moncton, and one to the town of Bathurst, each of which bills referred to several separate and distinct matters. There were two considerations involved, one that if the bills were allowed to go through the House in the form in which they now stood there would be a loss of fees which would have to be paid had each matter been the subject of a separate bill.

Major Tilley. Major Tilley said that as a member of the committee he desired to associate himself with what the previous speaker said. The whole matter was boiled down to two points, whether a separate fee should be paid for each distinct matter of the bill or whether it would still be shrewdly to consolidate a number of different matters in one general bill and the other was that it would be very confusing to have a lot of different subjects contained in a bill of which the title would probably refer to only one of them.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said the matter was an important one and was very properly brought before the House. As to the St. John bill there could be no province and if the bill went through as it stood no one would ever find this out. Hon. Mr. Byrne said that he was sure his members would acquit him of any desire to create difficulty, but he certainly could not put the St. John bill and Bathurst bill in the same category. The Hon. member from the city of St. John (Potts) had complained that he (Byrne) had thrown no light on the discussion but the House could not expect him to give a decided opinion on the point raised until he had heard what other Hon. members views on the subject were.

Hon. Mr. Potts (St. John).

Mr. Potts said the House was looking for light from the Attorney General but did not get it and he for one was no wiser on the subject when the Hon. gentleman sat down than he was before he got up. He regretted that the Hon. member for St. John county (Baxter) was not his guest for a dinner, as it seemed that the Attorney General wished to discriminate against the county's bill. He did not approve of consolidating a number of different subjects in one bill, and the bills in

question should be sent back to the committee with instructions to make three separate bills out of each of them.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that he was very much interested in the Bathurst bill, which certainly could not be said to relate to three different matters in the same way as the St. John bill did.

Hon. Mr. Murray (Kings).

Hon. Mr. Murray (Kings) said he regretted to see his Hon. friends opposite trying to make a party question out of the discussion as such a course was quite unworthy of the House. Nothing had been said by any member on the opposition side which could raise a party issue. The matter had been brought in and very properly brought up by the Hon. member from Northumberland for a ruling as to the practice to be followed. If the practice which had been followed for the last few years was objectionable it should be wiped out. He trusted that the members would get together and discuss the matter calmly and intelligently and not split at each other across the floor as they appeared inclined to do at that period.

Hon. Mr. Foster said that there was no need whatever for any feeling in the matter.

Mr. Campbell (St. John).

Mr. Campbell agreed with what the premier said and there was no need whatever for any fireworks in connection with the discussion. The standing rules committee were performing a great service in bringing the matter up. He had no knowledge whatever as to what was in the Bathurst and Moncton bills, but the St. John bill certainly appeared to him to need dividing into at least three parts. He also agreed that there was need for reduction in the scale of fees. He had been somewhat surprised to be asked by the provincial treasurer to pay a fee of \$400 on the bill which he introduced yesterday relating to the rates and taxes in the city of St. John and he had felt it necessary to consult the city authorities on the matter.

Hon. Mr. Robinson congratulated the committee on doing their duty so thoroughly. Such had not always been the case in his experience. He strongly approved of the proposal to have the bills divided up as it would make it very much easier for reference and in his opinion, in a sense, a sense of the city of St. John but at the same time he noticed that there was a clause in the bill which affected every municipality in the province and if the bill went through as it stood no one would ever find this out.

By Mr. Crockett as to improvements on the road from St. Andrews to St. Stephen.

By Mr. Hunter as to the repairs to the Harvey road.

Hon. Mr. Murray (Kings) introduced a bill to amend the towns incorporation act relating to the town of Sussex.

Hon. Mr. Robinson presented the petition of the city council of the city of Fredericton in favor of the passage of the bill relating to the said city.

Hon. Mr. Veniot presented the petition of C. O. Fish, H. P. Robinson and Reid McManus praying for the passage of a bill incorporating the Bathurst Electric Waterworks Co.

Mr. Dyant presented the petition of the Richibucto and Rexton electric light district commissioners for the passage of a bill to amend the act relating to the said district.

Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced a bill to amend the schools act.

Hon. Mr. Robinson introduced a bill to amend the schools act relating to the city of Moncton.

Dr. Campbell introduced a bill respecting the assessing and levying of taxes for the city of St. John.

Hon. Mr. Robinson presented the petition of the Moncton Board of School Trustees for the passage of an act relating to sinking funds.

Want Names Changed.

Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to enable Daniel Edward McKown, Frances Maria McKown and William Joseph McKown to change their names. He explained that it was the intention of the members of the family to adopt the name of O'Donnell and they had agreed among themselves to ask for necessary legislation.

Hon. Mr. Robinson, in the absence of Hon. Mr. Murray, provincial secretary, introduced a bill to amend the consolidated act statutes respecting the solemnization of marriages.

Hon. Mr. Foster with the unanimous consent of the House, moved, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Murray (Kings), the following resolution:

"Resolved that five members of this Legislature be appointed to attend the War Conference in Montreal, three of them to be nominated and two by the Hon. Leader of the Opposition."

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

On motion of Mr. Foster the House adjourned until Monday evening, May 28th, at 8.30 o'clock.
