

MILITARISTS OF CHINA NOT MONARCHISTS

Only Object is to Protect Chief
Executive and Further Re-
publican Government.

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Washington, Sept. 21.—Chang Tso-Lin Wan Chen-Yun Tsao Kun Li Chun and other Chinese military governors have formally denounced the monarchist movement, according to a report from Peking today, and have issued the following statement:

"It is generally reported that there are two factions in China, one advocating the return of the monarchy and the other standing for a republic as form of government.

"The monarchist report that the monarchists are in the ascendancy, but it is evident that the monarchists have been put into circulation by those who are bent upon our annihilation, so as to plunge the situation again into hopeless disorder.

"We hereby declare that our sole object is to protect the chief executive and to further a true republican form of government, in accordance with the will of the people."

The signers were associated together in the overthrow of the Anti-club in Peking of which Marshal Tuan Chai-Jui, formerly premier, was the most powerful member and are now in control of the Peking government.

The advent report no real progress in the negotiations between the north and the south and it appears that the southern leaders who heretofore have indicated a desire to come to an accommodation with the Peking government are apprehensive that the government of Chang Tso-Lin, the director general of the Manchurian province, will strengthen the monarchist after bringing the republican government of China into greater disrepute.

Chang Tso-Lin is believed to be opposed to the republican plan for the financing of China by foreign interests on the ground that the conditions would limit China's exercise of sovereignty and tend to make it an international ward.

POP BOTTLES AT BULL FIGHT.

Madrid, Sept. 21.—Bull fighting, from the spectators' point of view, is becoming almost as strenuous as baseball. Bullfight "fans" at Hara, disappointed with the work of the bulls, assailed him with a volley of stones. He was obliged to seek police protection. "Pop" bottles are not available at Spanish bull fights, and spectators are therefore obliged to fall back upon rocks as ammunition when they feel impelled to demonstrate their disapproval.

Home Branch Comforts Settlers

Women of Soldier Settlement
Board Cheer and Help New
Land Army.

A sheet of reports from the Home Branch of the Soldier Settlement Board gives very interesting accounts of what the directors and some counsellors of that branch are doing to assist the women settlers in improving the conditions surrounding them but their new homes. Unfortunately, there are numerous cases where, owing to ill health, the settler's wife is handicapped. The Home Branch, however, endeavours to meet such unfavorable conditions and bring comfort to stricken families.

In one family, in one of the Eastern Provinces, there is a little girl, six years old, deaf and dumb from spinal meningitis. The Home Branch has secured the active interest of the Patriotic Fund and the unfortunate child is to secure the benefits of a training in an institution.

At another home the wife of a settler was found to be suffering from tuberculosis. She is receiving the kindly help of neighbors and societies through the intervention of the Home Branch. In another family a little child playing in the dirt was run into by a mow and her foot cut off. The Home Branch arranged the necessary medical services and hospital treatment. Where there are endemics, in connection with this home visitation work, there are many reports which show how well the wives of the settlers—many of them from the Old Country—are adapting themselves to their new conditions. One of these is described by the home counsellor as a lady of unusual intelligence. She knew nothing of housework when she married, but just worked along doing her best and the result is she is now described as a splendid house-maker and housekeeper. She wished bulletins on canning, poultry and buttermaking, which were furnished through the Home Branch.

This branch is doing a very fine work in lightening the burdens of the soldiers' dependent. They are welcome in the home and their efforts go far to improve the morale of the household and to bring about final success.

LONDON SEES HAND OF REDS IN BLAST

Evening Standard Prays Merciless Justice for Plotters in New York.

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London, Sept. 21.—The Evening Standard in a strong editorial tonight on the Wall street explosion, expressed what one finds to be the general sentiment in England. Writing on "The American Crime," the Standard asks what the Bolsheviks are doing to the attention of the Royal Humane Society. 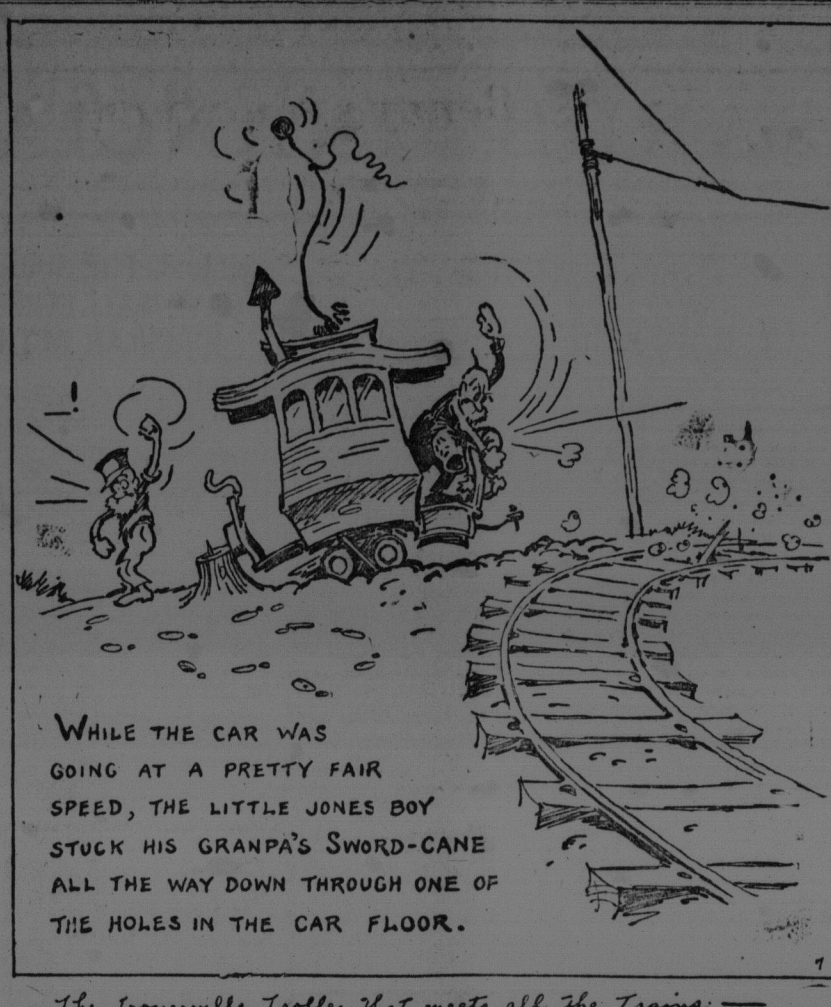
