## Commercial Club Regular Meeting

**Nomination of Officers for Coming Year—Many Suggestions Given.**

Regular meeting of the Commercial Club was held last evening in the G. W. V. A. Hall, mainly for the purpose of nomination of officers for the coming year. H. P. Mahan was chairman for the evening.

**Nominations**  
After reading the minutes of the last meeting, H. P. Mahan, secretary of the club, read the constitution regarding the election of officers. The nomination of officers followed. The secretary then read a letter written to the commissioner of public safety, asking on behalf of the Commercial Club, that the traffic law of St. John be better enforced. In reply the commissioner stated he would see that the request was carried out.

**Some Suggestions**  
Jas. McMurtry suggested there be an election of the by-laws in order to have an honorary president. He recommended the appointment of each retiring president as an honorary president for one year, and the honorary president hold nominal office, such as past president, and by-laws be so amended as to provide for this of floor.

## School Board Special Meeting

**Common Council Asked to Deed Site for School on King Square, West St. John**

A decision was reached last evening at the meeting of the Board of School Trustees that the council of the City of St. John should be asked to deed to the board a site for a school building on the King Square, West St. John. This in addition to the question of a suitable site for a school in the North End was the important matter which necessitated a special meeting of the board. The North End site is still under discussion.

There were present Dr. A. F. Emery, chairman; George R. Day, Thomas Nagle, A. A. McIlroy, R. E. Smith, Mrs. B. R. Taylor, Mrs. H. H. Green, and Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent of schools. The chairman of the North End site was first thoroughly gone into.

**An Objection.**  
Trustee Lawrie strongly objected to putting a school building on the King Square property on account of it being leased to the city. He said that this would be a very serious matter, and would seriously affect the value of the property.

**West Side Sites.**  
The chairman stated that the commission was given to the board to ascertain the feelings of the West Side people regarding the King Square site.

The following motion was passed moved by Thomas Nagle, seconded by Trustee Lawrie: "Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of St. John be requested by the Board of School Trustees to deed to the board a site for a school building on the King Square, West St. John."

This was passed unanimously.

Trustee Nagle said that he understood a meeting would be held by the council at which this matter will be taken up.

## Another Spanish Coin Is Found

**John J. McLeod, Former St. John Man, Finds Coin Dated 1815 at Portland, Me.**
