The bill grants about 40,000,000 acres of land, for which the company are to pay fifty cents an acre before obtaining the title, and are required to deposit \$500,000 as security that the work shall be faithfully performed.

Lebanon (N. H.) Shakers, state that more than thirty years' practice leads them to estimate ground corn at onethird higher than unground, as food for cattle, and especially for fattening pork. The same experience also induces them to put a higher value upon cooked than upon raw meal; and for fattening animals, swine particularly, they consider three of cooked equal to four bushels of raw meal. Until within the last three or four years they have fattened annually for thirty years, 40,000 to 50,000 pounds of pork exclusive of lard and offal fat; and their constant habit has been to cook the meal.
