

ARCUP supports Molsen boycott in principle



Delegates to the Atlantic Region Canadian University Press (ARCUP) conference at Antigonish take a break from a heavy schedule of discussions. Hosted by the Xaverian Weekly, the conference centered on attempts to promote regional co-operation.

The Atlantic Regional Canadian University Press saw six of its members papers in attendance at

an ARCUP conference last week-end. The conference, held at St.

Francis Xavier University, stressed the importance of unity and communication between univer-

sity papers. It was decided that the news letter proposed at the National conference be implemented. Staff exchanges between student newspapers were another of the means proposed to forward the improvement of student newspapers.

Chilean students refused aid

MONTREAL (CUP) - The administration at L'Universite du Quebec has refused to grant adequate financial aid to Chilean students following a Quebec Ministry of education tightening of immigrant loan eligibility criteria in September 1975.

The University Rector, Maurice Brossar, however, has granted \$2225 to cover total educational costs for 12 Chilean students as a result of pressure from student groups.

"This money will just cover first term tuition fees, and hardly compares with the full support they received last year," said a spokesperson for Pleniére Inter-Modulaire (PIM), a student association which has set up an ad hoc committee to investigate the

case. "Further, these funds represent only a loan of which the terms of payment are still to be worked out," he said.

The problem surfaced in December, when students finally received official word from the Ministry that they would not be eligible for government assistance.

But the students investigation of the situation has discovered that South Vietnamese students have been exempted from these requirements.

"Although the reasons given for this by the ministry are that other refugees are sufficiently rick to pay for their own education, this is clearly not the case", explained PIM ad hoc committee member

Deanna Leboeuf.

The students subsequently applied to the UQAM administration which, after pressure, claimed that while remaining sensitive to the situation, "it was incapable of maintaining special aid program because of financial problems."
