On the subject of the recognition of workmen's rights to organize the utterances of both leaders are here quoted:

On July 11th, 1918, the Hon.
Mr. Meighen, and the government of which he was a member,
made a definite pronouncement
on the subject of industrial
relations between employers
and employees, and the attitude
of the Government toward both,
the relevant parts of which
read as follows:

"That all employees have the right to organize in trade unions, and this right shall not be denied or interfered with in any manner whatsoever, and through their chosen representatives should be permitted and encouraged to negotiate with employers concerning working conditions, rates of pay, or other grievances.

On Aug. 6th, 1914, the
Hon. Mr. King wrote Mr.
J.D. Rockefeller, Jr.,
respecting the demands of
miners in Colorado for
recognition of their union
and the right to negotiate
with their employers throug

his letter reads as
follows:
