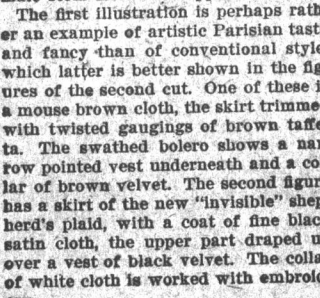

The collar of white cloth is worked with embroidery.

A large consignment of sugar beet seed from Wallaceburg Sugar Co. arrived at Darrell. Seeding will be commenced by the growers at once.

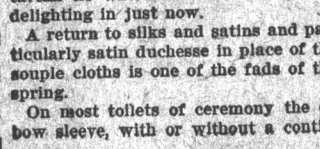
Stanley Clements spent Sunday at the home of his uncle, Wm. Arnold, here.

A Little Secret About Rice.
