> A SEA MONSTER VISITS ST. ANDREWS

The staff of the Biological Station re port the visit to to the shores of St. Andews, on Friday and Saturday last, of an interesting member of the whale family. Mr. Arthur Calder, an official of the Station, noticed a rather unusual object like an exposed bank of chalk or limestone protruding from the surface of the water between Joe's Point and Robbinston. A number of the staff kept watch, and observed the movements of the reported nonster. They identified it as a beluga or northern white whale, scientifically called Beluga leucas.
