Big Increase
Germany Plans to Have Greatest Army in The World.

BERLIN, March 29.—A bill increasing the German army by 4,000 officers, 15,000 non-commissioned officers and 116,965 privates was adopted by the Federal Council to-day.

The present strength of the active army is thus raised approximately 870,000 men with the colors.

The Government's financial measures includes a non-recurrent tax of from \$243,750,000 to \$250,000,000 spread over two years, and a permanent yearly increase in taxation of from \$45,000,000 to \$47,500,000.

The non-recurrent tax will be obtained by a levy of \$2.25 per thousand on fortunes beginning at 25,500, and a supplementary income tax of two per cent on incomes running above \$12,500 annually.

The yearly expenditure will be covered by insurance policies and articles of incorporation of companies in the States to the nation, and by assessing the States about 31 per

Hon. W. S. Fielding Evidently is Tired of England.

LONDON, March 29.—Hon. W. S. Fielding sailed for home to-day on the Victorian. It has been alleged that he has endeavored to work with British Radicals to defeat the Borden naval scheme. When the allegation was made Hon. Mr. Fielding said: "If I thought I could do anything to secure the adoption of the Lathier policy I would gladly do it, but as I am not aware that there is anything I could do in that direction I am content to leave the matter in other hands."

When seen by the Canadian Associated Press yesterday, Mr. Fielding was courteous, but decidedly refused to say anything regarding the matter, nor would he express any opinion regarding the present Canadian Parliamentary situation. "I do not wish to discuss political matters at all just now," he remarked. He mentioned that he would probably be in England again during the summer. Among other Victorian passengers was Sir William Mackenzie.
