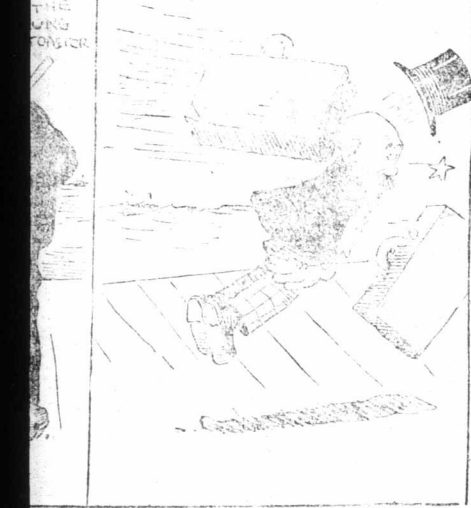

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Holloway Explosions Cause Little Damage

LONDON, Jan. 9.—There is no longer any doubt that two thunderous explosions outside Holloway Gaol last week were the work of militants. It was an attempt to blow two cavities in the outer wall of the gaol which borders the rear of Dalmeny avenue. Fuses had been laid, but no one was hurt, except, perhaps, the perpetrator, who, in her hurry to escape, left a tress of auburn hair entangled in the wire on the top of the garden wall.

The prison wall was not seriously undermined, but many windows were broken by the force of the explosion, and several residents' nerves shaken by a shock which on the 5th of November would not have made them turn a hair.

On the south-east side of Holloway Prison is Dalmeny avenue, running out of Camden road. A few yards down this avenue are two semi-detached houses, Nos. 10 and 12. The first of these, known as Rochester house, has been occupied for some time, though in the charge of a caretaker and his family, No. 12 is occupied by a family who for some months have let the bottom floor to the suffragettes.

The latter used it as a "home of rest" for the women who have been acting as sentinels round Holloway Prison ever since the suffragette prisoners have been undergoing sentence there.

Both these houses have long gardens, reaching about 80 feet to the rear. At the end of the gardens is a low brick wall separating them from a grass grown road about 15 feet wide, on the other side of which is the outer wall of the prison, which bounds the exercise yard, and is about 25 feet high.

A short distance away, and close to the main entrance to the prison, stands the residence of Mr. Paton (the medical officer of the prison), and at the rear of these are the quarters of the wardresses. The cells in which suffragettes are usually incarcerated are also in this quarter.

About 9.15 on Thursday evening the residents of Holloway and Camden Town were startled by two loud reports, which followed each other at an interval of about half a minute. The reports were heard as far away as Finsbury Park to the north, and at High Street, Camden Town, to the south.

Police, by means of their lanterns, found that two holes had been dug a few feet from each other at the base of the prison wall, opposite the end of the gardens behind 10 and 12 Dalmeny avenue.

In these holes some form of explosive had been buried—gunpowder, gun-cotton, or even dynamite. The explosive had been fired by a long fuse, which had been twisted round a wire. This was found reaching to the garden behind 10, Dalmeny avenue, and stretched some thirty or forty feet away from the prison wall. The force of the explosion had made two holes to the depth of 3 in. or 4 in. in the prison wall.

Just above the point where the fuse ended a wire stretched along the top of the garden wall, and entangled in this was a lock of a woman's auburn hair, which may prove a valuable clue, together with a piece of velvet ribbon about 3 foot long, such as women use to tie round their hair.

Superintendent Evans and Detective-Inspector Neil, took charge of affairs and ordered the removal of the wire and other articles to the police station pending further investigation.

The police also found in the "moat" a garden trowel of an unusual kind, the seller of which may be found and the buyer thus traced.

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BRITISH NEWS VIA THE MAIL BAG

Motor Accident at Brighton. Minnie Dival was killed on Saturday evening by a motor-car owned by a local gentleman.

An engine tender named John Thomas Grime was found dead on Saturday in the engine-house at Brock Mill, Chislebury. He had a bullet wound in the head, and held a revolver in his hand. Grime became very depressed after visiting a local oculist.

Husband Saves Wife's Life. As the steamship Dacre was lying in the Brockbank Dock, Bottle, on Saturday, preparing for sea, Mrs. Rock, wife of the chief officer, who went to bid him good-bye, fell into the water from the gangway. Her husband dived into the dock and rescued her.

Attack on a Brother. John Cuff Firebrater was at Heywood on Saturday, sent to prison for a month for drunkenness and for a brutal assault on his brother James. The latter, who gave evidence reluctantly, appeared in court with his head swathed in bandages and his eyes blackened.

Slippers for the Queen. Intimation was received at Bacup on Saturday to the effect that Queen Mary had accepted a case of slippers forwarded to her by the Rawtenstall Slipper Company. Her Majesty's private secretary, Mr. Wallington, wrote, stating that the Queen was charmed with the gift.

Young Woman's Suicide. Having obtained her master's gun, Ethel May Hopley, a servant, aged nineteen, of Hinstock, Market Drayton, loaded it, attached a piece of string to the trigger and a loop to her foot and shot herself dead. At the inquest on Saturday a verdict of "Suicide during temporary insanity" was returned.

Bullet in Head for Six Months. A verdict of "Suicide while temporarily insane" was returned at a Dudley inquest on Saturday on Geo. Clee, a commercial traveller. In June last he was found shot in a taxi-cab in Oxford street, London, and after his discharge from hospital was taken to Dudley by relatives. The bullet in his head had not been extracted.

Gasworks Explosion. Three men employed at the Birmingham Corporation Gasworks were badly burnt about the head and face by an explosion of gas in a retort house on the top of which they were working.

The explosion was due to a light coming in contact with an accumulation of gas, the presence of which was not suspected.

His Little Load. When arrested at Newport (Isle of Wight) on a charge of breaking into a provision shop, George Porter, of Seavies, was searched. In his possession were found soap tablets, bottles of embrocation, a lung tonic, cod roes, a stuffed pigeon, calves tongues, anchovy paste, and margarine. Charged on Saturday, he was remanded.

Motor-car Wrecked. A motor-car smash took place on Saturday afternoon on the outskirts of Sheffield. A finely built car in charge of Mr. J. Hall, of London, was travelling at about fourteen miles an hour when the steering gear failed and the vehicle dashed into a tree at the roadside and was wrecked. The driver was uninjured, but two ladies, Mrs. Hart and Miss Baker, were injured.

Open Air Justice. His Honor Sir Thomas Snagge adopted a novel method of trying an action at Wellington on Monday. A cyclist claimed damages for being run down by a motor car. The judge decided that the most satisfactory way of hearing the case was to hold his court at the spot where the accident occurred.

Here the accident was reconstructed, and in the end his honor held that the cyclist lost his head, and gave a verdict for the motor car driver.

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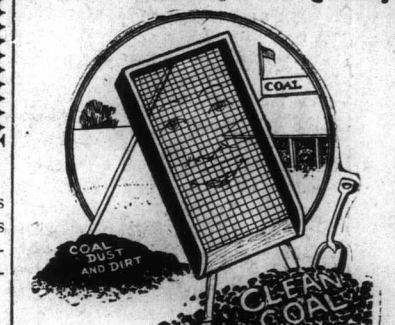
