The new metallic telephone line is completed from Kentville to Windsor.

Capt McKinlay's schooner M D S is being copper painted near the wharf here. She will afterwards proceed to some Kings County port to be loaded with potatoes for Havana.

The goose supper at Avonport on Tuesday night, 29th, was a grand success. There was a good crowd present to partake of the geese and other eatables provided. The supper was continued Wednesday night. The proceeds amounted to some \$87, to be used in repairs on the Methodist and Baptist place of worship at Avonport.

Mr. Alex Menis of Kentville, has removed to the place lately occupied by Robert Grierson on top of Joe Bell hill. Mr. Menis has rented his former residence to the town of Kentville as a hospital for the new cases of Small pox. There was another case discovered on Friday last, Mrs. James Yould.

There is a great demand for shares in the Hantsport Mining and Development Co. but the \$3500 stock has been taken up long ago. Nearly every day Secretary Comstock receives requests for stock. One of the shareholders says he will not take \$20 per share for his stock. The boring is proceeding favorably. On Monday the drill had sunk to 115 feet and the good work is being confidently pushed forward with encouraging signs of success in finding coal.

The barquentine was successfully launched at Parraboro on Oct. 15th. The Reynard is a vessel of 638 tons gross and 560 tons register. She is 164 feet long, 34.8 feet wide, and 18.4 feet deep, and has a hurricane deck the full length of the vessel. She is all coppered, has steam hoisting gear, and is all rigged, sails bent, and ballasted. She will proceed at once to Hantsport to load for South America. She was built by D. A. Huntley, under the supervision of W. R. Huntley Lloyd's inspector. She is classed for thirteen years. The Reynard is owned by Capt. Wm. Baxter, of Canning, and others, and will be commanded by Capt. Asa B. Bataux.—News.
