## DOMINION DAY RECORD ESTABLISHED BY OLD SOL

Yesterday was the Warmest Weather Article Registered in Chatham for Years—Thermometer was Working Over-time all Day.

Yesterday was the hottest First of July Chatham has seen for the last twenty years, and while people were sweltering yesterday they wondered if something out of the ordinary was not doing it was.

At noon yesterday the thermometer registered 97.1-2 degrees. This is warmer than any day last year, the thermometer having registered only 95 during the hottest day last year. On the first of July last year the mercury rose to 95 degrees, in '99 it was up to 84 degrees; in '98, 93 degrees; in '97, 84 degrees; in '96, 87 degrees; in '95, 81 degrees; in '94, 91 degrees; and in '93, 81 degrees. A very small amount of rain fell last night. This, however, did not seem to effect the weather much, as the thermometer again stood at 99 degrees at noon to-day. The barometer was rising this morning, so that chances for rain are very poor. The country through Kent, is in very bad condition for the want of rain.

There were several prostrations resulting from the extreme heat. None of these, however, proved very serious. Road Eau and the trip across the lake on the City of Chatham were very popular with Chatham citizens yesterday. A very large number took

Dresden, Wiley, skip 9, Musson skip 17-29.  
Blenheim-Gosnell, skip 23, Mulholland, skip 23-46.  
Ridgetown-Gundy, skip 20, Graham, skip 12-32.  
Windsor-Wigle, skip 13, Arnold, skip 16-29.  
Petrolia-Cameron 12, Greenizan, 14-20.

This competition left Thamesville, Chatham, St. Thomas, Blenheim and Windsor in the next round for the Sutherland trophy, the losers competing for the Banner-News prize, Windsor drew a bye and the following was the result of the senior series:—  
Chatham-Bray and Taylor, 41; Thamesville, Duncan and Currie, 21.  
Blenheim-Mulholland and Gosnell, 41; St. Thomas-Williamson and Dempsey, 33.

For the second round of the Banner-News trophy, London's two rinks defeated Walkerville's two rinks of 34 to 8, and 14 to 13; Petrolia, Cameron, defeated Ridgetown, Gundy, 18 to 13, and Ridgetown, Graham, defeated Petrolia, Greenizan, 34 to 22, Windsor and Dresden drew byes.

In the third Banner-News round, London, McDougall, skip, Thamesville, Duncan, skip 12; London, Brown, 22, Thamesville, Currie, 19; St. Thomas, Dempsey, 16; Dresden, Musson, 14; Dresden, Wiley, 17; St. Thomas, Williamson, 16; Petrolia and Ridgetown drew byes.

Chatham drawing a bye, Blenheim and Windsor competed for the Sutherland trophy with the following result:—  
Blenheim-Gosnell, 19, Mulholland, 22-41.  
Windsor-Wigle, 18, Arnold, 16-34.

This left Blenheim in the race with Chatham for the Sutherland trophy and a spirited game resulted. In the final shot the "bow" delivered by skip R. V. Bray, struck a boy's foot and the end was played over. This accident practically gave the game and trophy to Blenheim, by the following score:—  
Chatham-Bray 18, Taylor 14-27.  
Blenheim-Gosnell 18, Mulholland 15-28.

For the senior finals in the Banner-News contest, St. Thomas, Dempsey, defeated Dresden, Wiley, by a score of 16 to 15. London, was also in the senior finals, but having to catch a train home, agreed to play the winners of the St. Thomas-Dresden game at a place to be mutually agreed on. St. Thomas and London will therefore compete for the Banner-News trophy next week.

"No, that's no good. Play a running shot and raise this one."

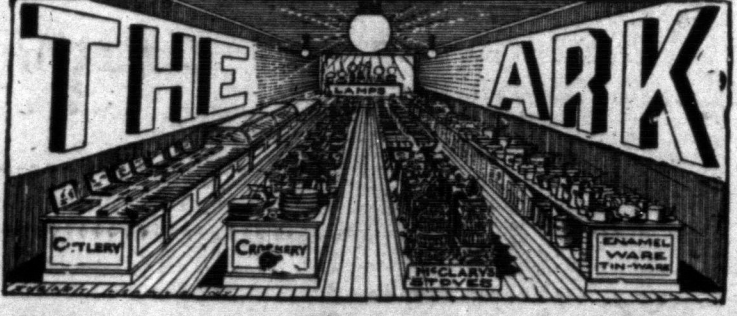

For a moment Chatham shouts were delighted and congratulatory, but they were followed by those of Blenheim. Dr. Bray's fine shot had given Chatham two points on the end, but they had needed three to tie.

Blenheim had won the Sutherland trophy by one point.
