Campbell-Cook

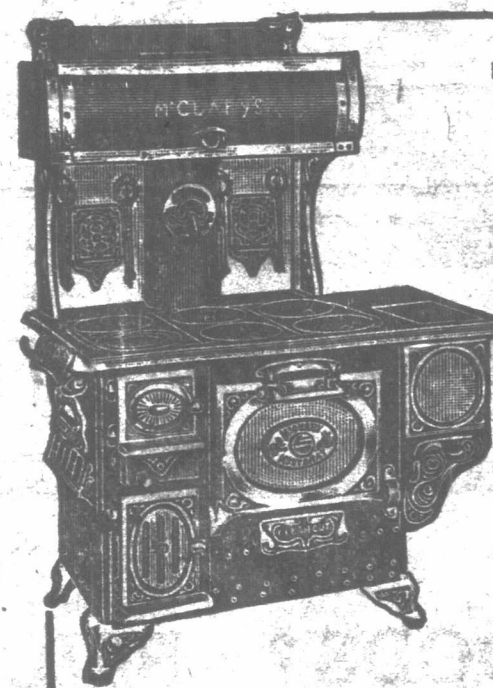
