THE ELECTIONS.

When the ballots were counted on Saturday it was found that the government had been sustained, but that its leader and his coadjutors had been defeated in the fight for their own country. It was also found that Westmorland had been untrue to her record and had elected three of the four government men offered. These constitute the greatest surprise of the day. It has always been conceded that any opposition to Mr. Blair in York would be a fight against great odds. To that county the late premier has been a most lavish provider; what fact coupled with Mr. Blair's great personal popularity, naturally made the county opposition strongly government. But the people of York have had more opportunity of seeing how affairs are administered at the capital than those at this distance and have given their verdict according to their approval or disapproval. One act which disgusted Mr. Blair's personal friends was the removal of Mr. Crockett from the office of Chief Superintendent, an act which for want of a better name, we may call a removal of a man from his position of honor and respect to a position of disgrace and dishonor. The government has the majority of members, but as that government has been largely a one man government and that one man Mr. Blair, who has been defeated it can not as yet transpire what will be done. There have been two acts talked of for him one in this county where one of the members is said to have announced his willingness to resign to give Mr. Blair a chance and in Queen's Mr. Emmerson has signified his willingness to turn Albert over to his fallen chief if it will turn. These offers if made a month hence might be credited with a flavor of sincerity, but when made on election night when the elected member is flushed with glory and his heart is twice its natural size it goes for little if not accepted at once. There is another view of the case. It has been felt that for years Mr. Blair has been too much of a leader. He led on all sides. He pushed from behind as strongly as he pulled in front and some of his colleagues did not take kindly to his vigorous rule. Now that he is down and out, they may feel a certain sense of relief and manifest no great anxiety to get him back again. The fact also remains that Mr. Blair has played the part of the heavy villain in a single piece of political rascality or jobbery that he had not engaged in. His acts have given New Brunswick a name which is the reverse of enviable and his colleagues realize that with him out of the control the moral and financial credit of the province would be favorably enhanced and the opposition less bitter. As to Westmorland there is little to say. Outside of the county the people may be deceived with the idea that it was the voice of the people which was heard on Saturday but no greater error could exist. The honest, clear thinking people of Westmorland are no fonder of Northumberland deals, Leary jobs, sham investigations, ambiguous book keeping, bogus reforms and bridge steals than are the people of St. John or York. The vote that was heard was sweet with the silvery notes from Woodlawn and Fredericton. That delicious melody which soothed the commercial voter in 1891 burst into full chorus in 1892 with all the irresistible force of its persuasive power. The cry of loods is usually the first utterance of the defeated in elections, yet with the full force of that fact in mind we have it to state that never has this county witnessed a carnival of corruption, which for systematic and deliberate defiance of law, was equal that given by the government on Saturday. In Moncton the main array was congregated and open purchase and personation were the order of the day. There is a limit to human endurance and some of the impersonators will be prosecuted. In Sackville the boodling was done upon the Saturday night principles and was given a shade of business like respectability. It may be complimentary to the local government workers or it may be otherwise, but gentlemen from outside handled the funds in the seclusion of a private office in the building and not a copy was allowed to touch the fingers of those who in previous contests had a hand in the scrimmage. One clear case of perjury is reported and we learn it is the intention to put the accused on the defensive at an early date.

DECLARATION DAY.

Yesterday was Declaration Day for Westmorland and the returning officer declared J. W. Y. Smith, Amasa Kilham, Henry A. Powell and W. Woodbury Wells elected, according to the figures given elsewhere. A determined effort was made to have the Solicitor General counted in but it failed to work, and Mr. Richard remains in private life. At the close the candidates thanked the electors for the support accorded them in the contest. Mr. Richard spoke briefly of his opponents and complained of the canvasses which had been made against him. He said he was not beaten and in the course of a few weeks would come before the people again. Just what he meant none can know.

In St. John county, McKewen and McLeod tied and Sheriff Harding gave the casting vote in favor of the government candidate, Mr. McLeod. In Restigouche, Murray, opposition is in and in Carleton Dr. Atkinson.

THE ELECTION.

The Government sustained. The Premier bites the dust.

The provincial general local election was held on Saturday in all counties with the exception of Madawaska where an independent was returned by acclamation and in Gloucester where by reason of a delay in the issue of the writ the election was not held until Monday. The results of the polling had two surprises, one the defeat of the Attorney General, Blair and his whole ticket in York county, the other was the overturn in this county. The defeat of Messrs. Melanson, Wilberforce Wells and Sumner in this county is to be regretted. During his tenure of office Mr. Melanson has shown himself to be an able representative of the Acadian people, ever faithful. The fierce political fight which is now being waged across the border will assume a less bitter aspect for a few days incident to the sad news from the White House. Mrs. Harrison, wife of President Benjamin Harrison died early Tuesday morning. For some days before her decease Mr. Harrison's condition was the occasion of perpetual enquiry and on Monday it was first known that she was ill. The illness of the first lady of the land naturally threw a feeling of mutual sympathy among the contestants and the fight has been robbed of some of its bitter acrimony. Canadians will join their cousins in the Republic in their expressions of sympathy.

ALL LOVERS OF JUSTICE.

ALL LOVERS OF JUSTICE will be glad to hear that the Methodist conference has moved in the matter of the charges preferred by D. D. Currie against Rev. Robert Crisp. The details of the early history of the Currie scandal are familiar to all. A few months ago Mr. Currie published a letter in the St. John Gazette setting forth charges of the gravest character against Mr. Crisp and accusing him of being guilty of the crime for which he was charged. Mr. Crisp in a manner bluffed these charges and asked for an investigation. Strange as it may appear that when Rev. Mr. Howie of the district which Mr. Crisp is now stationed asked Mr. Currie to have his charges formally presented he refused to take the matter up. The conference have now taken the case in hand and are determined to probe it to the bottom. Mr. Currie wrote with the spirit of an innocent man and it may be that he is blameless of the charges which sent him from the pulpit. Common justice demands that he be given every chance to clear his character and if he fails then he will hold his peace for all time.

Maritime Matters.

Erasmus Wiman is advertised to give four political lectures in the maritime provinces. He was at Halifax on Monday last, and will give a night in St. John tomorrow evening.

—The executors of the estate of the late J. P. Mott sold yesterday a property on Tulip street, Dartmouth, to Walter Allison. Henry Creighton transferred yesterday all interest in lands and premises of the late J. P. Mott to Walter Allison.

—Rev. Dr. McCulloch and wife, of Truro, celebrated their golden wedding last Thursday. The doctor was pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Truro, the oldest in Canada, for half a century. He was the recipient of many tokens of love and esteem.

—A young man named Henry Patterson, of Pictou, N. S., was about his business on Saturday last. Twenty-four hours later he was dead. Within an hour after one of his two sisters died. On Tuesday the second sister, the last member of the family passed away. The three funerals took place at the one time.

—A man named Connors belonging to a vessel lying at Mulgrave, N. S., attempted to leave the vessel in the present night to get something to drink and fell into the water and was drowned. Another fatal accident due to drink occurred at Pictou on Saturday. When a man named Goodhue was run over by a train and killed.

—John A. Brown left his wife and child at Pictou, N. S., about three or four years ago, word came by mail that he had fallen from a vessel and had been drowned. Three years ago the supposed widow married again. On Wednesday, Sadie Brown received word from her father in Westingham, Mass. It is not known whether Mr. Brown has married since.

—The apple evaporator, under the management of F. C. Whitman, Annapolis, opened last week with the work of staff of about twenty hands. More will be taken on when the work comes in a few weeks. Owing to the cholera scare the report of cholera will be absolutely prohibited for the present season. There about 1,000 barrels at the works now; they expect to put 20,000 barrels through. Car loads of apples and schooner loads are arriving each day.

—Saturday morning a laborer at Truro named Haley was awakened by the crying of the baby. He called his wife but received no answer, and was horrified to find her dead. Death had been caused by heart disease. The child showed the poor woman had been addicted to drink and that she had been caused by a recent fall down several steps of the house which spans the railway track.

—A disgraced scene was enacted on a bridge street last evening near the corner of Duke street. A crowd of delapidated haywagons was roughed board coffin painted black. Seated on it were two colored men both much the worse for drink. The water tower was characteristic of wild men. One whistled and shouted while the other danced upon the coffin. After the unseemly performance, which lasted half hour, the men drove off en route to Beech Hill where an internment is to take place today. —Herald.

The Northport Quarries.

The Freestone Quarry on the Alex. Beaton farm, Cold Spring Head, Northport, N. S., has during the past summer reopened next year. The property was first opened in 1890 by Austin Roberts and is managed by the Northport Freestone Quarry Co. in which Mr. Roberts is interested. This quarry is a complete almost entirely of New York capitalists who are interested extensively in building operations. The quarry has this year a fleet of wharves built and laid with double track to run the stone to the vessels. A spacious boarding house for the men has been built and it is expected that between 40 and 50 will be employed. The stone is of a reddish brown shade and free from dirt and scales and is offered at cost to clear. Highest prices paid for all kinds of country produce.
