Not subject to timber license. Restigouche 7, Northumberland 7, Madawaska 2, Queens 1, Albert 1. Of these 6 of Restigouche, 6 of Northumberland and 2 of Madawaska were taken by Acadians. In the Blue Bell Tract, Cyr and Nadeau Settlements, 12 applications are approved, one subject to timber license, and 11 are not subject. Of these 12 all but 3 are taken by Acadians. Of the total 55 lots, French-Canadians or Acadians have taken 47.
