It is rumored that the Marquis of Lorne will be succeeded as Governor-General by Lord Dufferin. The San Francisco mails received New York recently in five days from the Golden Gate, the fastest time on record.

EDWARD HACKETT, Esq., M. P., left with his family last week for Ottawa, where he is undertaking his residence. There are being taken to have a monument erected in Montreal to the memory of the late Hon. Tim. D'Arcy McGee.

The demand for potatoes in the Boston market is fair. They are quoted at from 75 to 80 cents per bushel, according to quality. Of the nine candidates who presented themselves at the Civil Service examination held here last week, eight were successful.

FRANCIS EDWARD INGLIS is enjoying the finest autumn of which that antiquated individual "the oldest inhabitant," has any recollection. PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND potatoes and turnips are selling in Halifax for 25 cents per bushel. Prices have advanced slightly in the United States.

P., Island, loaded with coal and potatoes, was wrecked on Monday at the entrance to Sheet Harbor, Halifax County. No insurance.

FREDERICK seems to be in danger from a gang of incendiaries. Two buildings were burned to the ground, and several more set on fire during the past week. At the last meeting of the City Council, Drs. Jenkins, Taylor and Conway were appointed delegates to the medical convention, soon to be held in Ottawa.

THE CITY of New Orleans was in darkness for several nights last week, not being able to pay its gas bills. The debt is an old one, amounting to over \$200,000. ST. ANDREW'S DAY—This annual Festival will be celebrated under the auspices of the Canadian Club at the Rankin House in this City, on Thursday, the 23rd inst.

The general election in Newfoundland is over, and, as was anticipated, the progressive government, led by Sir Wilfrid Whitehair, has been triumphantly re-elected. As foreshadowed in our Boston letter, in last week's HERALD, General Butler has been elected Governor of Massachusetts, and the Democrats have met with extraordinary success.

THE Very Rev. Dean Cleary died in St. John's, Newfoundland, recently, having attained the patriarchal age of nearly ninety years. He was in the fifty-fourth year of his sacred ministry. The steamer "Carroll" arrived at seven o'clock this morning from Boston with freight and the following passengers: Miss Marie, James P. Duffy, H. S. Ames, S. G. Gay, David Smith.

The election of a member for King's County, New Brunswick, to the House of Commons, resulted in the return of Professor Power, a supporter of the Government, by a majority of 80 votes. Two summonses have been issued against truckmen to appear before the Magistrate on Monday for cruelty to animals. His Honor expressed himself as determined to do heavily for the offence. The Newfoundland Railway is progressing favorably; \$200,000 a month are paid in wages. The branch line between Hantsport and Carleton Place is now open. Trains are running daily between St. John's and Holyrood.

MR. BERRILL'S show dancer. He took up \$1,000 of the recent Quebec province loan-bearing five per cent. interest at about 25 per cent. and went to Paris and returned with three to pay it at three percent. It was a sharp transaction, and will net him \$20,000 a year for twenty or more years. BUSINESS seems to be rushing in Summerside. The Pioneer says that on Monday last, the steamer "St. Lawrence" took away 21 horses and 20 sheep—and that the exports from that port during 5 days valued \$60,000. The shipments for corresponding week last year, valued with these 5 days, valued less than \$50,000.

This is not right, and calls for immediate improvement in the service. Our mails should be delivered on time, instead of arriving at nearly midnight, as they sometimes do. DROWNING ACCIDENTS AT FOWLER, N. B.—Charles A. Graham, Fugate, Agent of the Halifax Banking Company, and Gilbert Murdoch, Jr., a railway engineer, went boat-sailing on the harbor, on Friday. Not returning that evening, a search was made next morning, and the boat and Mr. Graham's body were found near Port Phillip, four miles east of Fowlers. Mr. Murdoch's body was discovered on Sunday morning, having drifted ashore about half a mile from where Mr. Graham was picked up. It is thought that the boat upset in tacking.
