LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain), died at his home at Redding, Conn., on Thursday evening last, aged 74 years.

For the first time in history there was April snow at Atlanta, Georgia, Monday, which lasted three hours. The fall was as heavy as any of the past winter.

The lives of eighteen miners were on Friday snuffed out in a tremendous explosion in the Yonglophney Company's Mine, at Amsterdam. Seven men, bruised and burned, were rescued.

The Dominion Coal Company intend to erect those strikers living in their houses at the mines. There are still over 100 families living in the company's houses, the men of which are among the strikers.

This information came from Sault Ste. Marie, on the 21st: Famine is threatening the steamer blockaded above and below the Soo locks. Hungry sailors have exhausted their supplies, and urgent wireless messages have been sent for relief.

The Maritime Oil Fields Co. have another big strike of natural gas near Hillsboro, N. B. A flow yielding over 800,000 cubic feet per day has been started. The yield of gas from the different wells, including the latest is estimated at 2,500,000 cubic feet daily.

In the most disastrous and far-reaching storm experienced in a generation, damage amounting to \$20,000,000 was wrought in the Middle West to the budding crops, fruits and vegetables. This is the information contained in Chicago advices of the 25th.

The arrival of the Victorian at Halifax, from Liverpool on Saturday with fifteen hundred passengers, marked the close of the winter season. From now the mail boats will run up the St. Lawrence. During winter months, more than 34,000 passengers across the Atlantic were brought to Halifax by four of the steamship lines.

The Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, has received a telegram from Australia, conveying the information of the death of J. S. Larke, Canadian Trade Commissioner there, Larke was appointed by McKenzie Bowell in 1894, and was first Canadian Trade Commissioner.

Record breaking temperatures accompanied the hot wave that was experienced on the west coast of Newfoundland for the past few days. At points where the normal temperature is below freezing, the thermometers registered 85 degrees in the shade. These figures are unprecedented in the history of the colony. This is the intelligence from St. John's, Nfld., on the 25th.

Bishop Cameron, by his last will and testament, gave the whole of his large and valuable library to St. Francis Xavier's. The library of our lamented and learned Bishop is a large and select collection of the world's best books—in fact, one of the finest in these Provinces. This gift will undoubtedly make Montreal, St. Francis Xavier's Library the best library east of Montreal—Casket.

The following have been appointed adjusters under the provisions of the Land Assessment Act passed at the recent session of the Legislature:—East Queen's, James J. Wisner, Wisner's Mills, Lot 48, West Queen's, Argentes Moffat, New Glasgow, East Prince, James Carruthers, North Beledque, West Prince, James C. McKendrick, Campbellton, Lot 4, East King's, James Howlett, Gowan Brae, West King's, Archibald D. Matheson Dundas Centre, Lot 55.

In the supplementary estimates submitted to the Dominion House of Commons last week, the following appropriations for this Province were included: Additional Dominion buildings at Charlottetown, \$13,500; armory at Summerside, \$10,000; public building at Tignish, \$5,000; Crapaud harbor repairs; \$1,250; Miramichab harbor extension of break-water pier, \$5,500; repairs to pier at Murray Harbor North, \$500; repairs to break-water at St. Peter's harbor, \$5,000.

His Grace, Most Rev. Archbishop McNeill, of Vancouver, B. C., accompanied by his Grace Archbishop McDonald, of Pictou, arrived here Saturday evening on a visit to his Lordship Bishop McDonald, of Charlottetown. On Sunday the Grace Archbishop McNeill celebrated Solemn Pontifical Mass in the Cathedral, with Rev. Joseph Gallant as assistant priest; Rev. Pius McDonald, deacon; Rev. Maurice McDonald, sub-deacon, and Rev. Dr. McLellan, Master of Cereemonies. The sermon of the day was preached by Rev. Dr. McLellan. Both Archbishops returned to Pictou Monday. From thence Archbishop McNeill proceeded to Halifax. After a short stay at Halifax he goes to Montreal, and from there starts for his new archiepiscopal see, where he expects to arrive about the middle of May.

St. Dunstan's College "Red and White" for March was laid on our table some weeks ago, but we have not hitherto found time to give attention to its contents. The number before us contains about seventy pages of reading matter with several illustrations. The contents are in prose and verse original and selected, and are classified as editorial, contributed articles, college chronicle, etc. In general the literary merits of the brochure are quite praiseworthy, although here and there, a little closer scrutiny of the proof-reader would have effected some slight improvements. The editorial, as well as some of the contributed articles, express opinions on some of the live public questions of the day. While not dissenting from the views set forth in this connection, we have our doubts as to whether or not it is best for a college periodical publication such as "Red and White," to enter upon discussions of this nature. The best article in this number, to our mind, is that which discusses "The Land Tax Clause of the British Budget." Taken altogether, the March number of "Red and White" is a highly meritorious publication and reflects much credit on all engaged in its production.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

President Taft has received from Governor Hughes, of New York, a letter accepting appointment as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Gen. Sir John French will arrive at Quebec May 20th next. He will go to Toronto and Hamilton, and then to Ottawa. He will visit almost all the provinces, and be here six weeks.

Dr. F. F. Kelly's many friends are pleased to see him home again. He underwent a successful operation at the Carney Hospital, Boston, and he hopes to be able in a few days to resume his practice.

The London Standard, specializing editorially on Lord Kitchener's duties as Commander-in-Chief of the Mediterranean, remarks: "It is hinted that he may enjoy some undefined authority over the troops of the self-governing colonies, acting in association with the Local Executive."

Ottawa advices of yesterday say: It is announced at the Government House Ottawa, that a State Ball will take place May 10th. This means that Parliament will prorogue May 14th. The Government business is now being rushed forward, and there will be a rapid clearance of the order paper in the next fortnight.

Seppelin 2, one of the three dirigible balloons of the German Government aerial fleet, ran away on Monday and was destroyed. The airship was forced to descend owing to a storm encountered while attempting a return trip from Hamburg to Cologne.

Mrs. Sarah Hann, in the employ of Alex. Mesphine, at Welland Ont., was burned to death last Monday night in a fire which totally destroyed the residence. Mrs. Hann got out once, but ran back to save some clothing and perished.

Sir William Van Horne announced at Montreal on Monday that he had resigned as Chairman of the Board of Directors of the C. P. R. He said that he would retain a seat at the Board; but he was getting old, and intended withdrawing as much as possible from active work.

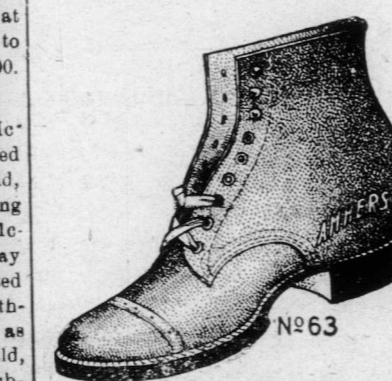
