

The Central Africans. At a missionary meeting lately held in England, the great African explorer, Dr. Livingstone, said: "I should like to answer a question that is often put to me. What sort of people are those who wander among the hills and mountains of the interior? They are not savages, but when you get about three hundred miles into the interior, you meet with people who are quite mild and hospitable. It is the duty of each man in the world to give every stranger his supper, and to show him every hospitality which lies in his power. These people are not engaged in hunting as most of the inhabitants of the country think they are; they are employed in cultivating the soil. They also manufacture a superior quality of copper, and articles of excellent workmanship. When we first go among this class of people, with the idea of their being savages, it is rather singular, but I believe that, they rather welcome us as savages. They do not understand where all the black people who are carried away go to. Thousands are taken away every year, and you can see signs anywhere without meeting with slave parties. The men carry what are called slave-sticks, with a fork at the end of them, which are used around the necks of the captives, so that it is impossible for them to get out of them or get at the other end, by which they are tied to trees throughout the night. The people I am now speaking of imagine that the white people eat them. They look upon us as animals, and we look upon them as savages. Now, if we take an impartial view of both, we shall find that they are better than each imagines the other to be." [Africa Repository.]

The Speed of Railroads. The Great Western Express to Exeter, England, travels at the rate of forty-three miles an hour, including stoppages, or fifty-five miles an hour without including stoppages. To attain this rate, a speed of sixty miles an hour is adopted midway between the stations, and in certain experimental trips, seventy miles an hour has been reached. A speed of seventy miles an hour is about equivalent to thirty yards per second, or thirty-five yards between two beats of a common clock. All objects near the eye of a passenger traveling at this rate will pass by his eye in the thirty-fifth part of a second, and if thirty-five trains were erected at the side of the road a yard apart, the eye would be distinguished one from another; if pointed out, they would appear collectively as a continuous flash of red light. At two trains with this speed passed each other, the relative velocity would be seventy yards per second, and if one of the trains were seventy yards long it would pass by in a single second. Supposing the locomotive which draws such a train to have driving wheels seven feet in diameter, these wheels will revolve three times in a second—but as there are ten cylinders which act alternately, there are really twenty pulls or escapes of steam in a second. The locomotive can be heard "cough" when moving slowly, the cough being occasioned by the chimney; but twenty coughs per second cannot be separated by the ear, their individuality becoming lost. Such a locomotive speed is equal to nearly one-fourth of a cannon ball; and the momentum of a whole train moving at full speed would be nearly equivalent to the aggregate force of a number of cannon balls equal to one-fourth of the train.

Religion and Health.—Henry Ward Beecher, in his Lecture-room talks, in the Independent, thinks that health is the first step toward a healthy religious experience. He says—"You will say, perhaps, 'What, then, is there no religion for the infirm and sick?' Yes, but that does not alter the fact that in their religious experiences they are more or less gloomy and desponding. It is not always the effect of disease to produce gloom and despondency; sometimes it heightens the sensibilities; but, as a general thing, religious experiences are sadder and more rational in a healthy mind and a healthy body. So, I say that the first step, you must be healthy if you expect to have broad, deep, and sweet experiences. Health is a Christian duty. I have heard persons praying, and praying for the presence of God; and I thought that if they would eat less and work more, and spend twice as much time in the open air, they would not need to pray so much. What they wanted was not answer to prayer, but simple obedience to the laws of God in nature."

ARRANGING GROUNDS WITH SHRUBS.—In the "Scottish Farmer," J. Men. makes the following judicious suggestion on laying out grounds, which we commend to those of our readers who are desirous of heightening the attractiveness of home by a beautiful ordering of its surroundings. "It ought to be a primary object when arranging grounds with trees, shrubs, and grass, to make them appear from the neighbouring windows like a well-balanced landscape picture, having a partially open foreground, with a distinct background, where the outline of the trees can be well brought out. Many gardens have anything but a landscape effect, although they possess the requisite material for the purpose. In order to arrange grounds in a satisfactory manner, broad spaces of well-kept grass, with fine shaped trees standing upon it, will be found infinitely more pleasing than a dense thicket of foliage."

THE OLDEST MAN IN THE WORLD.—It is claimed that the oldest man in the world resides in Caledonia, Columbia County, Wisconsin. The name of the person is Joseph Crele. He was born in Detroit, and the record of his baptism in the Catholic church of that city shows that he is now one hundred and thirty-nine years old. Crele was married in New Orleans one hundred and nine years ago, whence he removed to Prairie du Chien while Wisconsin was yet a province of France. He now resides with a daughter by his third wife, who is over seventy years of age. The old gentleman is quite active, and can walk several miles a day.

The Galt Herd says: "The Village of Waterloo, which failed in any way to recognize the birth day of our Gracious Sovereign, has disgraced itself forever by a 4th of July celebration, in which the Mayor, a man holding office under the British Crown, took the lead.
