Household Notes.

When next frying oysters, dip them first in mayonnaise and then in crumbs before immersing in the deep fat. They will be found delicious.

Do not destroy any net from old curtains. Cut into squares of desired size and stitch together, and they will make excellent washcloths.

Be careful never to use too much butter in cake. Use a scant amount; rather than what the rule calls for, and it will save many a poor cake.

If gilt frames are coated with copal varnish it will preserve them and they can be washed with water without removing the lustre from the gilt.

A saucer of baked beans can be heated with catnip in a pan and a spoonful of toasted crackers serves nicely for the noonday luncheon.

Wipe off screens with a duster each morning and beat with a soft brush. The beating should be done lightly in order that the wire be not injured.

Cold water, a teaspoonful of ammonia and soap will remove machine grease when other means would not answer on account of colors running.

Don't handle the dough any more than necessary when making biscuits, doughnuts and cookies. The more you handle it the tougher it will become.

To wash water bottles or any vase having a long neck, fill with clear, hot water and tiny bits of corn paper. Shake well and rinse in clear water.

When frying doughnuts, French fried potatoes or anything of the kind drain on brown paper and you will find the grease drawn out into the paper.

Romaine served with French dressing is tasty. If grated pineapple cheese is added it improves the flavor as well as the appearance of the dish.

water, bathe them night and morning with a mild astringent, such as two grains of alum to two ounces of water.

A small piece of window glass is useful to hold the leaves of the cook-book apart so that one can read a receipt and not soil the book by handling.

An old-country cream for chapped hands, to be rubbed in at night, is made of spermaceti, one ounce; almond oil, two ounces; orange flower water, two ounces.

A half can of tomatoes can be used to make tomato soufflé. Season with salt and pepper, add butter, strain and add a cup of cream. Serve with salted crackers.

An oily complexion can only be overcome by avoiding greasy, pastries rich cake, etc. Water must be freely drunk between meals and plenty of fruit eaten.

When using valuable vases for table decorations fill them with sand, for this makes them stand firmly and renders them less likely to be knocked over and broken.

Don't put the salt into cold milk when making a custard. Put the salt in after the milk has been scalded; otherwise the custard will separate as though curdled.


