The ship was sen down with provisions to relieve the destitution said to be existing on Lab rador, and was at Battle Harbor for three weeks in May, being unable to get further north owing to ice. The flour, &c., on board was transferred to the Beothic. The ship later got down to Spear Cape, ten miles be-low Battle Harbor. 
