Log Like a Novel.

One Tragedy Follows Another on a Voyage of Steamer.

San Francisco, Dec. 17.—The log of the liner Korea, which arrived yesterday from the Orient, reads like the table of contents of a dime novel.

One day out from San Francisco a Chinese passenger jumped overboard and was drowned.

Another Chinese passenger was claimed as the victim of a Tong war before the ship reached Honolulu. He had sought to save his life by flight from San Francisco's Chinatown, but a gunman from the enemy's ranks sailed with him on the Korea, and found an opportunity to fire the fatal bullet. The slayer is held by the Federal authorities at Honolulu.

Before the liner left that port another Chinese made an unsuccessful attempt to commit suicide, and a day later still another Chinese jumped overboard to his death.

At Yokohama, on the homeward voyage, a Japanese peddler plunged

a knife into the back of Andrew Benussi, a watchman on the ship. The peddler fled, but was captured on another ship in the harbor. Benussi recovered.

Dec. 9.—E. C. Miller, a cabin passenger from Manila, was giving his 2-year-old son a bath when he accidentally turned on the hot water. The child was scalded so badly that he died an hour later.

Real Feat in Raising Roof.

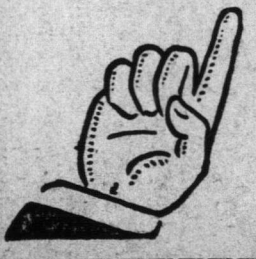
One of 600 Tons Suspended 75 Feet in Air During Re-building.

Norristown, Pa., Dec. 20.—A remarkable engineering feat was accomplished at the Alan Wood plant at Ivy Rock, when a steel roof weighing 600 tons was lifted from one of the mills to a height of 40 feet above the perpendicular sides of the mill, 35 feet high. The work was done by the McClintic-Marshall Company of Fottstown, which under contract to do the work in four hours, accomplished it, with time to spare. Artisans immediately began to build the sides of the mill to meet the suspended roof, which is being held in the air, mainly by cables suspended by large steam cranes.

When the crane engines were first started on the lift, the immense covering was run up ten feet in three minutes. With readjustment of cables and machinery, the roof was raised ten feet in each succeeding three lifts. The purpose of raising the roof and making the building higher is to accommodate the larger electric cranes that are to be installed to handle

the manufactured steel. According to engineers who examined the large shell suspended in the air, it is not the slightest out of plumb.

Michael Quinn's Death.

The general impression amongst the employees at Goodridge's premises is that the late Michael Quinn who was drowned there Saturday, was blown over the dock in the high wind that prevailed. Made Willett of the schooner, Ida M. Lynch, was putting a bow line on the vessel at the easternmost wharf when he saw the body floating in the water and told watchman Parrot. The men quickly had the body on the wharf and brought it to the watch house where Dr. O'Connell who was summoned attended quickly and tried for some time to restore animation but without avail. It is evident that the unfortunate man struck some object in going overboard as several of his teeth were knocked out and he had a slight cut on his head. It is not unlikely that he was stunned by the blow received and thus could make no outcry. The deceased had been for some time as cook at one of the lumber camps at Badger Brook and only came to the city about a week ago. The remains will be interred this afternoon.

Change of Steamship Routes.

Despite the blizzard raging Saturday midnight the work of loading the S. S. Stephano was continued and the ship got away for Halifax and New York at daylight Sunday morning. At the latter port the liner has to be docked for an overhauling and is scheduled to leave New York on January 13th for Cuba, which together with a number of other West Indian ports, she will call at in the passenger service. During her absence the Black Diamond liner City of Sydney will be put on the Red Cross route. The Stephano will return to St. John's the latter part of February to prepare for the seal fishery.

Miss Laura Barnum, cousin of the bride, was bridesmaid, while Mr. R. Colford, of N.Y., performed the duties of best man. Quite a number of friends of the happy couple were present. After the happy event was solemnized the wedding party motorized to Murray's Hotel, where luncheon was served and the happy couple left amidst the usual showers of good wishes and rice for Norwich, New York, to spend the honeymoon.
