Three Liberals for Harbor Grace, Sure!

The Graballs on this end of Harbor Grace District made a surprise exhibition of their weakness last night. They organized a torchlight procession and sent delegates all over the place even inviting voters from Port-de-Grace district and after days of preparation could only get three hundred together; a great proportion of these were not voters; fully one-third being young boys. Some of the paraders also found it extremely difficult to carry their torches steadily but whether the trouble was the bad road or light heads, of course we can only surmise. There are upwards of fifteen hundred voters in this end of the district, and the Graball missionaries could only get one-fifth to declare openly for Piccott and his colleagues. The Liberal-Union committee meetings can make as good a showing almost any night of the week. Another indication of the weakness of the Graballs is the fact that Piccott's special

pets are now going round here begging Union men to give him a personal vote to save his election. They recognize the fact that Parsons and Young have absolutely no chance and that their only hope of getting a man at all is, to trade on supposed sympathy for Piccott, but the Liberal-Union men are a solid unit for their Party; they are absolutely disgusted with the mismanagement, neglect and favoritism that have marked the administration of public affairs since Piccott and his colleagues were elected four years ago. The Graball rule is once for all in Harbor Grace District.

Directions for the Electors in

Each elector, on entering where the Poll is held, declares his name, surname, and residence.

After doing so he receives a Ballot Paper in the name of each elector, if he is a Deputy Returning Officer, Clerk, one of the Canvassers, or any other person, he shall receive his ballot paper, if qualified.

The voter is to vote candidates.

After receiving his ballot paper, the voter shall go into the compartments, and, where provided, place his ballot paper in the division containing the name of the Candidate or Candidates whom he intends to vote.

The voter will then hand it to the Deputy Returning Officer, and the Deputy Returning Officer shall, after ascertaining that the Paper which he furnishes, and then immediately in the Ballot Box. The forthwith leave the Poll.

If a voter inadvertently lo Paper he may return it, if another.

If a voter votes for more than he is entitled to, places any mark on the places by which he can be identified, his vote will not be counted.

If a voter takes a Ballot Paper out of the Poll, fraudulently puts any Ballot Paper in the Poll, or by the Deputy Returning Officer will be subject to a Fine of Five Hundred by Imprisonment for a period of Six Months, with or without labour.

The following is public information of Electors St. John's, Eastern Division.

No. 1 Ward shall be the line commencing at the Head and running along any between St. John's Quidi Vidi section to the foot of the road on the Log (near Cook's), running Bay Road to the Torbay along the boundary between John's section and the

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
