Close Season for Regatta.

Recommended on Account of the War.

A meeting of last year's Regatta Committee, convened by the President—Mr. A. W. Hiscock, took place last night for the purpose of discussing the advisability of holding the annual Regatta this year. Besides President Hiscock others present were: Vice-President, W. J. Higgins; Treas. C. J. Ellis; Secretary, J. L. Noonan; F. J. Morris, W. J. Martin, R. W. Jeans, P. J. Hanley, N. Andrews, J. P. Crotty, N. J. Vinnicombe, L. G. Chafe, J. Day, R. Dowden, T. J. Moran, V. J. Crotty.

At the opening the President pointed out the object of the meeting, announced that he had interviewed persons who had always been large contributors and they were opposed to having the big aquatic event run on this year, owing to present conditions. His own opinion was of similar tenor. President Hiscock reported as a matter of general interest that, prior to the departure of our last contingent, 116 of last year's oarsmen had gone forward to do service for the Empire. This fact alone was the strongest argument that could be used in support of having a close season this year.

The following Resolution was moved:—

WHEREAS,—Since the holding of our last Regatta our Empire has been plunged into a war which has drawn from the community the best of our young manhood, of whom some have already paid the price of loyalty to the flag;

AND WHEREAS our Regatta may

fairly be said to be our day of general rejoicing and celebration;

RESOLVED,—that in the opinion of this Committee it is not advisable to hold the Regatta this year; and that this decision be conveyed to a public meeting of citizens called in the usual.

It was reported that the Committee had to their credit in the Bank the sum of \$274.43 and \$1.70 on hand. The meeting then adjourned.
