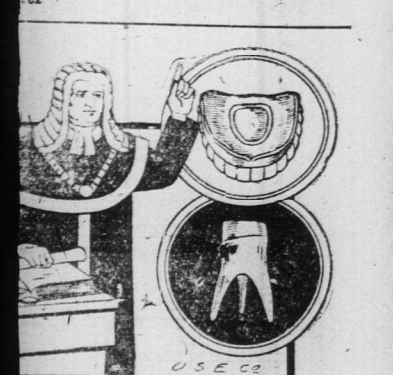

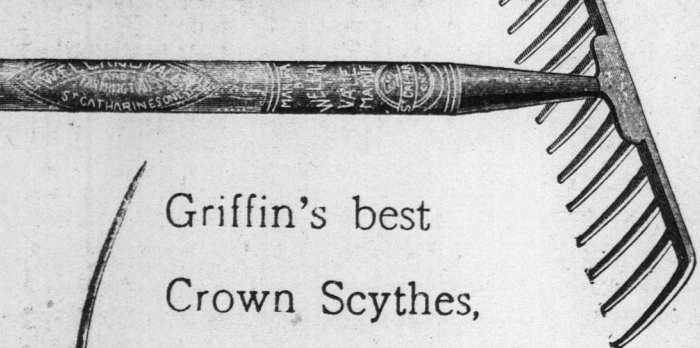

## From the Front

### REVENGE ON OTHER NEUTRALS.

PARIS, To-day.  
The Temps publishes a summary of  
the diplomatic situation between  
States and Germany and concludes  
the article with these words: What-  
ever be the desire of the United States  
to avoid conflict, certain rupture will  
follow any new exploits of German  
submarines, threatening the lives of  
American citizens. Although Ger-  
mans pretend America cannot war on  
a great nation without the greatest  
prejudice to herself, the probable  
firmness of attitude of the Govern-  
ment of the United States will be suf-  
ficient to impose prudence upon Ger-  
mans, who without daring to sink  
American vessels Germans probably  
will avenge themselves on ships of  
other neutrals.

### SUNK BY ITALIAN SUBMARINE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.  
The Turkish battleship Kheylef Din  
Barbaross, 9,900 tons displacement,  
formerly the German warship Kur-  
furst Friedrich, will be sunk by an  
Italian submarine of the Entente Pow-  
ers, according to an official announce-  
ment issued to-day by the Turkish  
Government. The majority of officers  
and men composing the crew of the  
battleship were saved. The official  
statement telling of the loss of the  
Barbaross which was sunk yesterday  
morning says however regrettable it  
self it does not affect us excessively,  
except it places the strength of our  
ships compared with the enemy at the  
ratio of one to ten. The Barbaross  
was built at Stettin in 1891 and pur-  
chased together with the battleship  
Reis from Germany by Turkey in 1910.  
The complement consisted of about  
600 officers and men.

### LONDON, To-day.

The British Foreign Office to-day  
notified the American Embassy at Lon-  
don that Americans as all aliens will  
be subject to registration under the  
British National Register Act. New  
arrivals henceforth will be allowed 30  
days in which to report themselves.  
This does not mean Americans can be  
pressed into National Service in any  
capacity, but bespeaks the Govern-  
ment's desire to check all persons in  
the United Kingdom. Forms are be-  
ing distributed this week. They are  
to be returned next Sunday.

### GERMAN FLEET ATTACK ON GULF OF RIGA.

PETROGRAD, To-day.  
The official explanation of the at-  
tack of the German fleet on Riga,  
given out last night, follows: The  
Gulf of Riga would allow the Ger-  
mans to give powerful aid to their  
army, now occupying the western  
coast of the Gulf. With the object of  
penetrating the Gulf, the fleet ap-  
peared on Sunday off Dugha Channel,  
which is the only practicable way for  
large ships to enter. The enemy made  
three attacks with the object of  
breaking the mine barrier protected  
by our fleet. Our seaplanes and war-  
ships co-operated to repel the enemy.  
The Germans did not succeed in pass-  
ing their defence line. Three of their  
vessels were damaged by mines near Dieben.  
None of our ships was lost.

### ATTACKS ON DARDANELLES RESUMED.

PARIS, To-day.  
The Allied forces have resumed  
their attack upon Turkish positions at  
the Dardanelles with great vigor dur-  
ing the last two days and have made  
sensible progress on the Gallipoli  
Peninsula, according to a Havas de-  
patch from Athens. The Turkish  
losses have been heavy. Simultane-  
ously the Allied fleet bombarded the  
Turkish positions on the Dardanelles,  
inflicting severe damage upon their  
defence works.

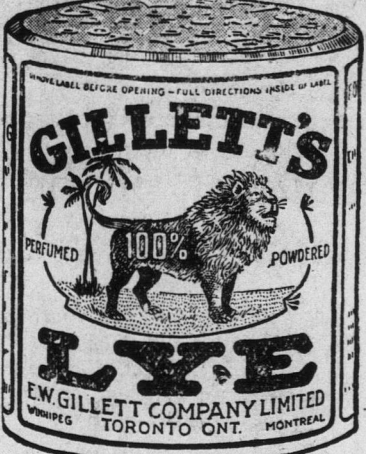
### RUSSIAN ARMY SAFE.

LONDON, To-day.  
Cabling from Petrograd, the corre-  
spondent of the Daily Telegraph says:  
If the views held in the higher mili-  
tary quarters here are well founded,  
any danger which may have existed  
for the Russian Vistula army is now  
past. The troops are now taking up  
the new positions allotted to them  
without precipitation, and at the mo-  
ment their rear is not threatened.  
Moreover there are signs that the im-  
petus of the Austro-German attack is  
weakening. There is private news  
from Vilna, where 2,000 prisoners have  
arrived, of fearful havoc wrought in  
the ranks of the Germans by the Rus-  
sian artillery at Kovno. Prisoners  
taken in battle state that the Ger-  
man army has been suffering from defi-  
ciency in food and that soldiers are  
worn out by continual marching and  
counter marching. Some of them  
were so exhausted when they were  
caught that they could hardly stand  
upright and begged only that they  
might be allowed to sleep.

### RUSSIA WILL REJECT PEACE PROPOSALS.

LONDON, To-day.  
Germany will renew her efforts of  
a separate peace to Russia, according  
to the Daily Mail, but the proposal  
will meet the same fate as others al-  
ready made. The Mail says that the  
Russians, obviously from self interest  
and apart from her pledges to the Al-  
lies, will compel her to reject the of-  
fer. German influence has been the

curse of Russia since the days of  
Peter the Great. The Mail declares it  
has been the curse of Russian society  
as it has been the curse of the Russian  
Government.  
The Russian positions in the Baltic  
Provinces are now described as firm.  
Southwest of Riga the enemy has  
been driven back almost to Mitau,  
is showing no inclination to resume  
the offensive, indeed it is believed  
to have drawn on his force here,  
which consists of about a corps and  
a half, to strengthen the impact of  
the attack east of Poniowich in the  
direction of the Dvinsk-Vilna railway.  
The battle in this latter region still  
hangs in the balance, but we are as-  
sured that the Germans during the  
past 24 hours, for which there is news,  
have made no headway.

### COTTON AS CONTRABAND.

LONDON, To-day.  
The declaration that cotton is to be  
regarded as contraband by the British  
Government, is expected within a  
few days. The situation is now in  
the hands of a committee of members  
of the Government.

### Charge of Larceny.

In the police court to-day John Al-  
sopp Potts, who had been em-  
ployed at Carter's Basin, Hamilton In-  
let, and who arrived by the Sagona  
last evening, was arraigned before Mr.  
Hutchings, K.C., on a charge of lar-  
ceny. The alleged larceny took place  
on March 22nd, 1914, and arrest was  
made last evening on the arrival of  
the Sagona by warrant issued as the  
result of a deposition made by the ac-  
cused's employer, Mr. Edward C. Rob-  
inson, in September last. The charge  
was that of opening a safe and steal-  
ing therefrom the sum of £15 ster-  
ling. Mr. C. E. Hurw, appeared for the  
prosecution, and Mr. W. J. Higgins for  
the prisoner, who was not asked to  
plead. The counsel for prisoner asked  
for bail and offered bonds in any  
sum to be named by the Magistrate.  
Two bonds of \$100 each were suggest-  
ed, but the counsel for the prosecu-  
tion agreed to take the word of ac-  
cused's counsel for the appearance of  
the prisoner when called.

## Schooner Sinks; Crew Safe.

A message from Channel to Mr. H.  
W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector,  
received to-day, states that the sch-  
r, Zetta, owned and commanded by  
George Lillington, of Isle au Mort,  
and bound to Burnt Island from  
North Sydney with a cargo of coal,  
sank about 20 miles off Channel Head  
last evening, the crew escaping in  
their dory. The Zetta had been leak-  
ing badly all the way from North  
Sydney, and the pumps had to be  
kept going all the time to keep her  
free. Suddenly they became choked  
presumably by the slack coal and  
the vessel sank, the crew barely es-  
caping with their lives. After the  
vessel went down the captain and  
crew headed for land in their dory,  
and all landed safely at St. John's  
Gulf, which is about 7 miles east of  
Cape Ray.

## Supreme Court.

The hearing of evidence in the ad-  
miralty case, the schr. Metapedia vs.  
the s.s. Drot, was continued in Cham-  
bers before Mr. Justice Emerson at  
the Supreme Court to-day. Four ex-  
pert witnesses were called and gave  
evidence on matters of navigation.  
Capt. Melkie, late of the s.s. Nascope,  
and Capt. Nichols of H. M. Customs  
were called by Purlong, K.C., for  
plaintiff, and Capt. Worral of the s.s.  
Polamhall and Capt. H. B. Saunders  
were called by Morine, K.C., who ap-  
peared for the defendant. The case  
was adjourned sine die.

### GERMAN LEAVE FOR GOLD.

A Dutch traveller returned from  
Germany says: "Every German sol-  
dier was recently told that he could  
have from two to seven days' leave  
if he changed one or more gold pieces  
for paper money. Parents, wives,  
sweethearts and relatives scraped to-  
gether all their gold in order to be  
able to see the men."
