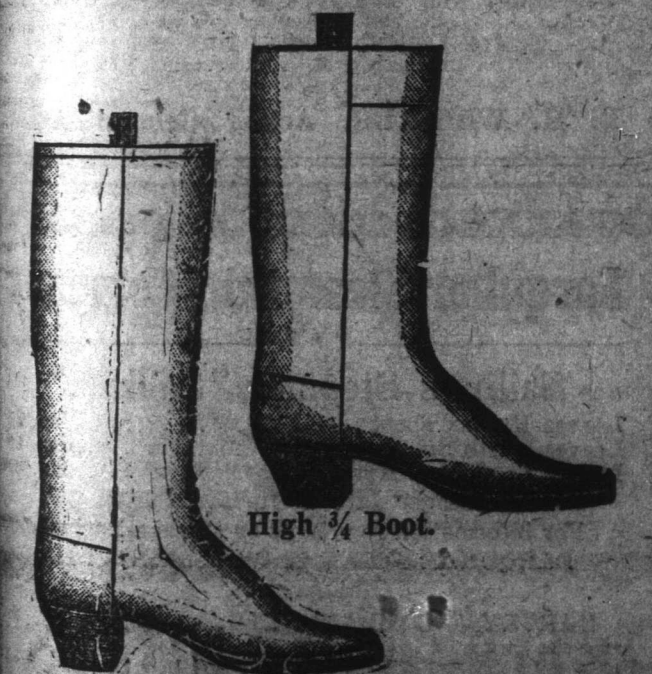

Low Stocks of Fish

IN BILBAO, SPAIN. The following message, received by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, from the High Commissioner, London, has been forwarded the Board of Trade: "Have received notification from British Consul at Bilbao, Spain, that there appears to be prospect of considerable shortage codfish that district during ensuing months. Stocks there at present do not exceed one thousand tons, whereas normally there are two thousand tons this time of the year. Council suggests that present moment might be opportune time for Newfoundland merchants place their fish on Bilbao market and states quotations c. i. f. Bilbao would be welcomed. Fish should be very best quality well cured, and good size."
