A very common cause for bad cheese was the impurity of the atmosphere in and sur-rounding the factory. If there is any bad atmosphere it is sure to effect the cheese— anything that will offend the nostrils will taint the cheese. He believed the milk was in some cases impure even before it left the udder of the cow. The cause of this was sometimes in the driv-

milk was in some cases impure even before it left the udder of the cow. The cause of this was sometimes in the driving of cows with dogs and wild boys, and thus they became fevered. Another cause—the pails are not always clean—the weighing can may not be clean—and all the many other appurtenances used may be in a slight degree tainted—all these causes considered, if it should be the case with either one of them, we cannot possibly have good cheese. Another cause for the impurity of flavor was the shortness of pasture. In summer cows are driven to the woods, where they get weeds, &c. We must sow corn or other feed for them to supply the shortness of pasture.
