MICKEY MCINTYRE GETS DECISION OVER BILLY GRIFFITH WELTER CHAMPION

Canadian Defeats Conqueror of Ray Bronson After Twelve Fast Rounds—Bout the Best Ever Held in Western Canada.

Arthur Pelkey Decisively Beats Andy Morris, Referee Stopping the Bout in the Eighth Round to Save Bostonian from Knockout.

Calgary boxing fans last night witnessed the best fight program ever staged in Canada, and quite of the par with any staged in the world. Every minute of the bill was a thriller, and the fans were kept on tenterhooks throughout. Mickey McIntyre, welterweight champion of Western Canada, defeated Billy Griffith, star of the welterweight championship of America, after twelve close rounds. The decision was very close. Arthur Pelkey lived up to the expectations of the fans, and easily defeated Andy Morris of Boston. He had the better of the argument all the way, and in the eighth round Tommy Burns stopped the bout, and awarded it to Pelkey to save Morris from a knockout.

The crowd in attendance was rather small, less than two thousand being present, but those who were there got the biggest run for their money than they ever got.

As a result of his win over Morris last night, Pelkey puts himself in line for the elimination series for the heavyweight championship of the world. He will meet Luck McCarty on May 24, and the winner of this affair will be matched with some of the other top-notchers.

McIntyre Now in Line Light. Mickey McIntyre now springs into the limelight as a welter, who will have to be reckoned with in the world's title is decided. Griffith is almost the undisputed welterweight champion of the world, his victory over Ray Bronson two weeks ago, establishing his right to claim the title. In justice to Griffith it must be said that he was traveling under a big handicap. He only arrived in Calgary two days before the bout, through a misunderstanding as to the date of the bout. Rather than disappoint the Calgary fans he agreed to carry out his part of the program.

The high altitude caught him in the wind, and he was unable to give the best account of himself. He realized his condition when he went into the ring. He played a waiting game throughout with the hope of landing a haymaker. But his judge of distance was poor, and the result of the round was almost blinded as a result of the fast pace that McIntyre set.

The win of McIntyre, while a popular one, was one not looked for. Before the bout Griffith was as high as a five to two favorite, an two to one bet on Griffith was common. In fact, a great deal of the Griffith money found no takers.

The writers scoring on the bout saw two rounds of McIntyre and one to Griffith. The other nine were even, with McIntyre having a shade on the seventh.

The man weighed in at 145 pounds. Each man appeared in splendid physical condition. However, as was stated before, the change from a low to a high altitude affected Griffith. McIntyre was fully acclimated, and forced the fight at all stages.

Mickey's Left Hand. McIntyre is a two-handed boxer, with a left which is especially effective. Fans who have seen Billy Lauder box will understand a comparison between these two men. Billy, it will be remembered, used his left with a one, two action, quick as lightning. If the first jab missed, the second was almost sure to land. This was the style which McIntyre used, except that he also used his left for an overhead swing.

Griffith was on the defensive most of the time and showed great cleverness. Time after time he ducked wicked right and left swings which would have been haymakers. He appeared to be saving up all the time, and rarely opened up with full steam. His gloves carried an awful kick, but were ineffective because of the owner's judge of distance.

In deciding the bout two of the judges gave the verdict as a draw and the other two as a win for McIntyre. This, according to the rules which govern in bouts held in Calgary, constitutes a win for McIntyre.

The bouts between the welter last night was so good that a return match will be sure to draw a packed house. After the battle Griffith stated he was perfectly satisfied with the decision and while he thought that a draw would have been fair he felt that McIntyre had it on him a little all the way. "In fact," Griffith said, "I couldn't hardly see the gloves after the bout was half way through."

Pelkey showed up to much better advantage in this bout than in the previous

COBB IS FORMALLY REINSTATED

Detroit Club and the Famous Ty Are Condemned by Ball Commissioners.

Chicago, May 1.—Ty Cobb today was formally reinstated in organized baseball and fined \$50 by the national baseball commission. A decision by the commission, given out in answer to the Detroit players' appeal for reinstatement, condemned Cobb severely for his actions while "holding out." The Detroit club was condemned for its recent stand and censured for its former passive policy regarding Cobb. Notice was served on other clubs that in case of their failure to discipline players whose actions are detrimental to the game, the commission itself will act.

The commission reserved news of any other action it may have taken and if the proposed congressional investigation into the alleged baseball trust was discussed at all, as reported, it was ignored so far as a formal report is concerned.
