The special topic which is now exercising the public is General Booth's scheme of social reform, which he has outlined ook, "In Darkest England and the The startling statements Way Out." therein made and the equally startling pro-positions contained in the work have challenged the attention of Great Britain, and have been discussed, usually in a sympamanner by the newspapers gener ally. In a recent interview, the General
