To the Editor of the Free Press:

In your editorial of Jan. 9, "Facts vs. Theory," statistics are given which are intended to show that the interest of the Canadian farmer lies in cultivating the trade with Great Britain instead of the United States. I have no theory to support, but it would seem that facts warrant the assertion that the people of Canada find it to their interest to trade with the people of the United States, despite the fact that tariff duties are levied in both countries.

An editorial in a New York paper under date Jan. 12, gives some facts which would be interesting reading alongside of your editorial, and I trust you will publish it, so that Canadian farmers and others may have the latest facts.

"CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES." The official figures of the Canadian Government respecting the Dominion trade and commerce for 1889 strengthen the argument long since put forth in these columns that Canada's great market is the United States.

Here are some of them in comparative columns:

	Exports.	Imports.
Great Britain.....	\$28,000,000	\$22,000,000
United States.....	\$13,500,000	\$50,500,000

The total trade between the United States and Canada was thus \$84,000,000, as against \$80,000,000 between Great Britain and Canada. The trade of Canada with this country has increased \$20,000,000 since 1878, while that with Great Britain has not appreciably changed in volume. As compared with 1888, exports to the United States increased \$1,000,000, and imports from the United States \$2,000,000. Exports to Great Britain fell off \$2,000,000, and imports from Great Britain increased \$1,000,000. It will be seen from these statistics that not only is the United States in the lead in trade with the Dominion, but that its lead is steadily increasing.

If it should become a question with Canada of giving up her trade relations with the United States, or becoming a part of this section, no reasoning man can doubt what her decision would be.

If you have no use for the above you may consign it to the waste basket. I hardly think it will suit your purposes. Yours respectfully,

Money.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:—I notice in one of your recent issues that the Biddulph freeholders held a meeting to protest against the exorbitant rates of interest charged by loan companies, in accordance with views expressed by R. Stanley, John Waters, M.P., and others. No doubt these farmers and many others as well have good reason to complain of the rates of interest charged them for loans obtained on their farms and real estate.

But while noticing this grievance, they lose sight of far greater ones that exist, and which are not as widely known as they ought to be or will be in future. I refer now to the "bonus" or "fine" system practiced by so many loan companies. I do not wish to blame all loan companies, for there are honorable ones among them who would not think of robbing their clients in the manner complained of. With the loan companies referred to, however, their clients fortunately become able to pay off their mortgages before maturity, they are plainly informed by the cautious manager that in addition to the principal and interest due, they will have to pay a "bonus" or "fine" for the privilege of having their money advanced. This "fine" or "bonus" is not always calculated upon or governed by any particular rule, but is usually based upon the gullibility of the victim and the physical condition of the manager. But sometimes the demand has been known to run up into hundreds of dollars. The manager of one loan company, not a thousand miles from London, has boasted that his company has cleared out of this blackmailing process in eighteen years the enormous sum of \$85,000. Surely a remedy for this evil can be provided, by legislation or otherwise. This is a question that interests everybody; and although there is certain legislation existing to partially control such matters, yet more is required, I fancy, to protect the public from such systematic robbery. Much more can and will be said on this interesting subject. But in the meantime, let farmers and others take some action, and when the facts and figures are brought to light public opinion will help to do the rest.

The prosperity of loan companies that adopt and practice this short-sighted policy, will certainly be materially lessened and their career checked when the truth becomes fully known. Then the directors will be compelled to "take the bull by the horns" in order to save themselves. And when this time comes, as it will soon, then the unfortunate borrowers may secure justice and have a chance to breathe more freely. Yours faithfully,

MICHIGAN MATTERS.

St. John's parochial school at Ypsilanti has been closed by the prevailing influenza, which got a grippe on the pupils and the sister teachers.

A little son of W. H. Riley, landlord of the Central House, at East Jordan, was run into by a cow on the sidewalk Monday, breaking his leg.

Cadillac High School building took fire Friday morning about 9 o'clock and was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$15,000, insured for \$9,000.

Mrs. P. Donohue, aged 80, mother of ex-Mayor T. F. Donohue, of Ishpeming, died Sunday night from influenza. So far there have been seven deaths in Ishpeming from the gripple.

George Duell, a 33 years convict from Schoolcraft county, was accidentally killed at the Branch State Prison, Marquette, on Tuesday, by falling earth while grading down a bank.

An abstract of the report made to the State Treasurer Jan. 7, 1889, shows the total resources and liabilities of the banks at that date to be \$38,963,417 19, the capital being \$5,619,425 and the deposits \$30,688,220 21.

Sundford lost one of her best citizens and benefactors on Sunday in the death of Sanford Childs, the oldest Oddfellow in the United States and a Mason of many years' standing. He was a little over 70 years of age and was one of the best-known farmers in that region. He leaves a large family in good circumstances.

An aged farmer named Cyrus Thompson, residing near Dearborn, was found frozen to death on Wednesday. He was near his residence. Mr. Thompson was 70 years of age and somewhat infirm, it is evident that he wandered from the road, lost his way and perished from cold. His family consists of three sons and two daughters.

The report of ore shipments by lake and rail from the iron mines of Lake Superior during 1889, show an output of 7,252,754 gross tons, being 2,257,343 tons in excess of the output of 1888. The estimated output for 1890 is 9,000,000 tons, and even that enormous quantity may be exceeded if the demand for ore continues as strong as now appears probable.

Hon. Fitch Phelps died on Wednesday at Grand Rapids from internal hemorrhage, supposed to have been caused by a fall while walking about town on Sunday afternoon. He kept his injury to himself so as not to alarm his invalid wife. It is thought that a slight attack of apoplexy caused him to fall. He has no children. His age was nearly 60 years. He served two terms each as representative and senator, and his death causes great sorrow.

The law of 1885, providing for the incorporation of mercantile and manufacturing companies, has emerged intact from its constitutional test in the Supreme Court. The application of Mr. Jenkins, of Detroit, for a mandamus to compel the Secretary of State to accept the articles of a new manufacturing company drawn under the provisions of the law of 1875, was denied, and in announcing its decision the court held that the present law is unconstitutional.

Two more fatalities occurred at the Veneer works, Grand Rapids, on Thursday. John Gibson fell into a tank filled with logs and boiling water, and was scalded so badly that he died at 9 o'clock. Andrew Killian and George Kingsworth, in attempting to rescue Gibson, fell into the vat and were scalded so badly that Kingsworth died next day. The doctors say that Andrew Killian, the third victim, will have to have both legs amputated at the knees to have both limbs saving his life. A man was scalded to death in the same vat two weeks ago.

The Grand Chapter R. A. M. elected officers as follows: G. H. P. Wm. G. Hudson, Lexington; D. G. H. P. Samuel C. Randall, Flint; G. K. John F. Barrows, Lawrence; G. S. Chas. R. Bagg, Detroit; G. Treas. H. Shaw Noble, Monroe; G. Sec. Wm. P. Innes, Grand Rapids; G. Chap. Rev. Francis A. Blakes, Detroit; G. C. of H. James C. Cummings, Holly; G. P. S. J. A. Conover, Coldwater; G. R. A. G. Chas. D. Blanchard, Marquette; G. Lecturer Arthur M. Clark, Lexington; G. M. of 3 V. Norris J. Friuk, of Marshall; G. M. of 2 V. L. B. Winsor, of Reed City; G. M. of 1 V. P. H. Degraffe, of Charlotte; G. Southern, Alex. McGregor, of Detroit; stewards, Geo. W. Dowling, of Montague, and Horace E. Hatch, of Lapeer. The grand body voted \$1,000 to aid the construction of the Masonic Home and endowed to the institution to the fullest extent, giving the warmest commendation possible.

WESTMINSTER TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Council met Jan. 20, all the members present. The committee appointed to examine the claim of T. Nichols for damages to a horse recommended that it be referred to the Reeve with power. Report adopted. After examining and settling some accounts the Council of 1889 finally dissolved.

The Council-elect for 1890, composed of J. T. Coughlin, Reeve; James McMillan; J. G. Fritchett, James K. Little and James K. Murphy, deputy reeves, qualified and took their oaths. It was decided that the deputy returning officers at the municipal election should be paid \$5 each, and \$1 for each polling place, and that the deputy returning officers in Ward 2 be paid \$2 each extra for the amputation vote. The Clerk having signified his wish to be relieved of the charge of the dog tax fund, it was resolved that in the future the Treasurer take charge of it. The Reeve nominated Dugald McPherson to be auditor, and the Council appointed David Lawson. It was decided that there be only two assessors for the township. Westcott was appointed assessor for Ward 1, H. Elliott for the balance of the township. The salaries of the officers were fixed as follows: For the assessors, Wm. Westcott, \$100; for John H. Elliott, \$100; for the Clerk, \$20; for the auditors, \$25 each. It was resolved that the collector be charged 5 per cent. on all arrears of taxes not paid to the Township Treasurer on or before the 25th inst. Bylaw No. 480—to appoint auditors and assessors—passed in due form. Bylaw No. 481 was passed to appoint the following gentlemen a board of health for the township for 1890, viz: J. T. Coughlin, H. Anderson, Dr. G. A. Routledge, Dr. J. M. Piper and James McMillan. Bylaw No. 482 was passed to appoint the Councilors to act as road commissioners in the several wards. Eighteen dollars was paid to P. Donohue for sheep killed by dogs; \$20 to City Gas Company per lamp or bridge; \$5 to Mrs. Murray, charity; \$5 to Mrs. McLean and \$5 to Mrs. McLean, for coal; \$10 to the sewer inspector; \$10 to the municipal election; \$21.50 to Board of Health for 1889. The next meeting of Council to be on the 28th inst. in February at Mr. L. Odell's. HENRY ANDERSON, township clerk.
