

No one seems able to answer them, and I doubt if Secretary Gresham himself has fully decided upon his policy. What will be the effect in those countries should the United States remain passive and allow Great Britain to collect the money after her own fashion, provided she does not seize any part of Nicaragua's territory? Such indifference would greatly injure the prestige of the United States in all the countries to the south of us. The Latin-American countries do not desire to drag the United States into a war with Great Britain or any other country unnecessarily. What they do expect, and they will be bitterly disappointed if their expectation is not realized, is that the United States will use its good offices to have the difficulty amicably settled.
