—Miss Edie Davidson and Miss Manning, of Detroit, are visiting Miss Annie Adams, King Street.

—The steamer Flora brought 60 passengers to Port Stanley, Saturday, and a large quantity of freight.

—The Emerald Beneficial Association intend running a cheap excursion to Detroit on Civic Holiday.

—Masters Brock and Harry Paton, city, are visiting with their aunt, Mrs. Dr. Hutton, Priceville, Grey county.

—Miss Ida Gordon, of Maitland street, has gone to Grand Bend to spend a week with her mother, Mrs. W. H. Gordon.

—Miss Atkinson, of Barton street, Toronto, is visiting her cousin, Miss Winnie Atkinson, Bruce street, South London.

—Miss Lena Phillips, of Queen's avenue, returned from Chicago Saturday, having spent a month with friends in that city.

—The shoe merchants of the city will close their places of business on every Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock until Aug. 30.

—Owing to the recent break city water has since been of a milky color. This is not caused by dirt, but simply by the admission of air into the pipes.

—Among the successful candidates at the recent examination for kindergarten directors held in Toronto was Miss Edith Slaght of this city, who obtained first honors.

—Mrs. Elizabeth Thompson, of Pond Mills, widow of the late James Thompson, died suddenly, after a few hours illness, on July 9. She was 78 years of age and well known throughout Westminster township.

—At Colborne street school, grade 4 to 5, the computer class of the following names were lost, not due to the fault of the pupils. Therefore the following are entitled to prizes: M. Sanborn 310; N. Butler 298; H. Hunt 376. The latter is second highest on the list.

—Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Merchant and children have arrived from London to summer here. They will spend several weeks at Leith, and Mr. Merchant also proposes organizing a yachting party to Dartmouth (Oven Sound Times).

—The London City Council has decided that the company awarded the electric railway charter shall give a bond of \$10,000 to guarantee adherence to the contract. These precautions make a city of experience like Toronto smile a broad smile. (Toronto Globe).

—The annual statement of the finances of the York Street Methodist Church for the year ending May 31, 1893, shows a total of \$4,131.97 expended for all purposes, as follows: Quarterly Board, \$1,167.44; Trust Board, \$1,526.61; connexional funds, \$810.50; Ladies' Aid, \$416.40; Sunday School, \$41.02.

—There were four persons charged with a breach of the fire limit by-law in the Police Court yesterday morning. The cases against Messrs. W. T. Gartley, James Johnston and Wm. Bowman were enlarged for a week. City Engineer Graydon's accusation against Mr. H. E. Boomer was withdrawn.

—Past Chancellor H. E. Young, who has been elected district deputy grand chancellor of the order of Knights of Pythias for the county of Essex, is a former Londoner, and of course a hustler. He was born here 32 years ago. After attending school he became a telegraph operator, but concluded that he was more fitted for the hotel business, and began as clerk at the Ocean House on Burlington Beach. He has been chief clerk at the Manning House in Windsor for several years, and he is considered one of the most popular men in the business in Canada. Resolution of Condolence.
A special meeting of the City Council was held on Saturday evening to take action in the matter of the death of school trustee the late J. B. Cook. Ald. Carrothers was in the chair. On motion of Ald. Heaman and Ald. Welford, it was resolved that whereas it has pleased God to remove by death James B. Cook, who for several years has represented this council on the board of the Collegiate Institute, be it resolved that this council places on record its high appreciation of the services rendered the city by the deceased in educational matters; and further that we tender our sincere sympathy and condolence to his bereaved wife and family in the great sorrow occasioned them by his death. It was also decided that the council should attend the funeral in person.

The Hurricane in Westminster.
The storm of Saturday afternoon did a great deal of damage in Westminster township. It was a hurricane of wind, accompanied by a downpour of rain, in some instances frozen into hail. John Scott's barn was partly unroofed. The shop of W. Scott was partially unroofed. B. Little's barn was lifted clean off its foundation and set down several feet away. The three disrepair last named were within 80 rods of each other. The storm unroofed several barns east and west of the street on which Scottville stands. The barn of Mr. Davis was lifted off its foundation and set down several feet away. A. McFarlane's barn was partly unroofed. Only one life was lost—that of a pig that was squeezed under John Scott's barn.

Funeral of the Late Mr. Cook.
The remains of the late Mr. J. B. Cook were interred in Woodland Cemetery yesterday. A full choral service was held in the Memorial Church prior to the formation of the cortege. Rev. Canon Richardson conducted it. The funeral procession was a lengthy one. Along the line of march, the Infantry School Band played solemn music. Col. Smith and Major Vidal were in command. Next in the line was Worshipful Brother D. C. Kennedy, of Corinthian, heading a company of 200 Masons. Following these were the Mayor and members of the council and Board of Education. V. W. Bro. Irving, V. W. Bro. H. C. Simpson, W. Bro. Methers, W. Bro. Tait, W. Bro. Bonny, and W. Bro. O. J. Biddle acted as pallbearers. Bringing up the rear were fully 60 carriages containing many prominent citizens. Large crowds assembled along the route, and upon all faces were looks of sympathetic grief.

Wednesday's Demonstration.
As the great Scottish demonstration and Highland games, which come off to-morrow at Port Stanley, approach, the public interest increases. Indeed, the gathering this year promises to be larger than even last year, when several thousands of Londoners enjoyed the entertainment provided. The games sub-committee of the joint committee of the St. Andrew's Society and Clan Fraser met on Saturday night and completed the programme of sports. It is large and varied, and many handsome prizes are offered. This year 25 events will come off—three more than last year—and almost every conceivable variety of athletics is included. The band of pipers will be composed of Pipers Angus and Milne, of this city; Murray, of Westminster, and Wilson and McLeod, of St. Thomas. The two last named will arrive in the city early on Wednesday morning, and will join the others in the parade, which will take place immediately prior to starting. The Band of the Seventh Battalion has also been engaged to accompany the excursionists, and will play "Annie Laurie," arranged as a march, while proceeding from the committee rooms on Dundas Street to the station.
