The letter was written a day before the arrival of the ship at that place, and was dated April 8. The men who died were Staff-Sergt. Purdon, of Montreal, form-erly of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, and Troopers Mann, of Montreal, and Patton, of Toronto. Purdon took a course in Toronto some time ago, but enlisted from Montreal. He was an Englishman. Mann was a son of G.

O. Mann, of Ottawa.

THIS IS DIFFERENT. Toronto, April 30 .- The report sent out from Ottawa that Esnest H. Patton, of Toronto, one of the Baden-Powell police, had died on the voyage, is incorrect. Mr. Patton, of this city, received a letter last night from his son, posted at Cape Verde Islands. The letter told the story of three deaths. Sergt.-Major Purdon had been in South Africa with the Canadian Mounted Rifles. E. H. Patton's letter says Purdon had contracted galloping consump-tion while in Ottawa, just before his departure with the constabulary.

BURIED AT SEA. St. Thomas, April 29.—Judge Ermatinger has received a letter from his son, Lieut. Percy Ermatinger, of the Baden-Powell police force, written on April 8, on board the Montfort and mailed at Cape Verde. In the letter he states that that was the first day for three days that they had not buried a man at sea.

A postscript of Tuesday, which would be the 9th, stated that another man had died, making four in all. Geo. A. Barrett had been made a corporal, and Lieut. Ermatinger expected Har-mon Couse would also be raised to that position, though it had not been officially announced. All from St. Thomas were well. It will have been noticed that the Montfort reached Cape Town on the 26th.
