FORESTS ABLAZE!

Great Tracts of Woodland in Michigan Being Swept by Flames.

Traverse City, Mich., April 30.—Bad forest fires are raging at Fouch, eight miles from here, and the depot is in danger of destruction. A large tract of valuable timber is ablaze, and everything is so dry that it is impossible to estimate when the flames can be stayed. A large quantity of cedar ties for the Manitoba and Northwestern Railway are threatened, and the woods on both sides of the track and about Carp Lake resort are ablaze. Lees Point, on the east side of Carp Lake, a pretty resort, of which Judge M. C. Burch, assistant United States attorney-general,

is principal owner, is also threatened by the fire. The woods surrounding the resort are in danger of destruction. There has been no rain for some time and the woods are as dry as tinder, and unless rain comes soon great damage to farm property and further tracts of valuable timber will result. The Manitoba and Northwestern Railroad Company have sent out gangs of section men from both directions along their line to fight the fire, and farmers and lumbermen in that vicinity are assisting.

IN WRETCHED CONDITION!

Boers Surrendering to the British Are Without Decent Clothing.

Fifty Per Cent of the Burghers in the Field Want to Surrender, But Cannot Escape From Their Commandos—Canadians Buried at Sea.

Durban, Natal, April 29.—The Boers who are surrendering at Standerton are in a wretched condition. Many of them are wearing trousers made of blankets. They state that 50 per cent of the burghers in the field desire to surrender, but cannot escape from their commandos. The British raiding parties have been successful in capturing cattle within the Boer lines and from their laagers.

The prime minister of Queensland has been entertained here. At the reception given in his honor representatives of the Canadian Government spoke. They said they were investigating matters connected with the trade between Canada and Natal, and were seeking means to improve the commercial relations between the two countries. They claimed that Canadians could supply as good products as the Americans, and that they were more honest in the dealings.

AFTER RHODES.
Cape Town, April 29.—A party of Boers blew up the railroad between Graspan and Belmont, Cape Colony, in three places. April 27, apparently with little doubt, the Boers were seen to be in the neighborhood of the line carrying Mr. Cecil Rhodes. The damage done was slight, and quickly repaired.

Melbourne, April 30.—The steamer Ophir, bearing the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, has been sighted off Cape Leeuwin, the most south-western point of Australia.

MILITARY APPOINTMENTS.
Gen. Sir Archibald Hunter has been appointed to the command of the forces in Scotland, and Gen. Ian Hamilton has been appointed military secretary to the war office.

POPE'S ENCYCLICAL FINISHED.
Paris, April 30.—A dispatch to the Patrie from Rome says the pope has finished his encyclical on the subject of anti-clerical measures in France, Spain and Portugal. It will probably be published in a fortnight.

FAVOR A STRIKE.
Paris, April 30.—The final results of the referendum show 28,800 miners in favor and 17,603 against the declaration of a general strike. None of the mining companies expect that a strike will be declared. In view of the fact that 100,000 of the miners abstained from voting.

CAUGHT A "RIPPER."
Oldwigshefen (Baden), April 30.—The notorious "Jack the Ripper," who has assaulted and mutilated here recently eighteen women, has been caught here red-handed by two detectives attired as women.

EIGHT SOLDIERS CREMATED.
Vannes, France, April 30.—Fire broke out at the artillery camp, in the vicinity of the village of St. Jean. Eight artillerymen were incinerated and several were injured.

BREAD OR WORK.
Lombardy, April 30.—A riot-out mob of the city unemployed today raided the bread booths at the market place, shouting "Give us bread or work." The mob paraded the streets, breaking shop windows. Troops finally arrived and dispersed the rioters. A deputation of the unemployed visited the burgomaster and the governor. Replying to their questions the officials held out some hope that work would soon be obtainable.

MASSACRED AND EATEN.
Sydney, N. S. W., April 30.—Herr Mercke, a German millinaire, who was cruising in his yacht, and Herr Carls, his private secretary, were recently murdered by natives of the Island of Papua. Herr Carls' body was eaten by the natives. Emperor William has sent a punitive expedition to avenge the murder of Herr Mercke.

EXTERMINATION.
Algiers, April 30.—Marguerite appears at the trial of Marguerite was provoked by Hadji Denaisa, a marabout, who had preached the extermination of foreigners. Many of the inhabitants of Algiers were so disassociated from religious ideas, and he prayed they would awaken to their responsibility to God and humanity in this respect.
