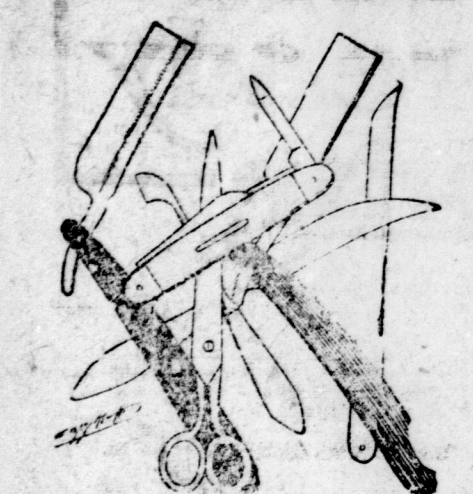

W. M. JONES AND POCOCK

Successful in the Race for the Water Commission.

Though a sweep did not take place by any means in the election of water commissioners, the methodical operation of the Conservative machine again did its work. Messrs. William Jones and John W. Pocock being elected, and Mr. John W. Jones, a Liberal, who was crowded off the court of revision by Mayor Beck and his friends to make room for a Conservative, was defeated. Two years ago Mr. Pocock was a candidate for water commissioner, but was defeated. This year he fortunately, from his point of view, was placed upon the Tory

state, and met with success. When Mr. Pocock made known his candidature to the public he was looked upon by many as an independent, and he in consequence received many independent votes which combined with the machine influence behind him, elected him over Mr. J. W. Jones.

Mr. Pocock also announced to the public that he was out to oppose filtered river water for London, and that a vote against him meant a vote for river water. Apparently this argument also bore fruit in pulling votes, the people seemingly being under the impression from Mr. Pocock's statements that the commissioners of last year were in favor of river water and nothing else, whereas up to the present no move has been made to shove a filtered water plant onto the public. It was merely proposed some time ago to lay the matter before the electors and allow them to say what they proposed to do to increase the water supply of London. Mr. Jones' defeat

was a surprise to his many friends in London, as well as a loss to the city, for he was a faithful, honest and untiring worker in the city's interests.

There was no election for the water commission a year ago the Messrs. Jones taking office by acclamation. In 1902, however, Messrs. John W. Little, Wm. Jones and J. W. Pocock ran, and the vote was as follows:

William Jones 2,987
John W. Jones 2,974
Pocock 2,916

A comparison of the figures shows that the vote for water commissioners this year is much smaller than two years ago, the total for 1902 being 8,257, while for 1904, the total is 7,294.

Yesterday was the last occasion upon which the people of London will be called upon to elect two water commissioners, for at the close of the present year under the new law, the commissioners elected yesterday must draw lots to see who retires, and the people will thereafter be called upon to elect one water commissioner each year.

votes, and yesterday Ald. Matthews was at the top with 2,245. In 1-02 the lowest candidate, ex-Ald. Douglass, was elected by 1,810 votes, and this year Ald. Grier, the lowest candidate, was elected by 1,896. Ex-Ald. Saunders is thus defeated by a very narrow majority.

The occupations of the new aldermen are as follows: Abram, builder; Becher, physician; Cooper, auctioneer; Forristal, manufacturer; Garratt, contractor; Gerry, builder; Greenlees, lawyer; Greer, manufacturer; Judd, lawyer; Matthews, printer; Stevely, merchant, and Wyatt, merchant.

The slain of last year's council are Messrs. Stevenson and Saunders, both of whom worked conscientiously for the city's good all through the year. The defeat of Ald. T. J. Murphy, this well-known citizen, comes as a surprise to his many friends, who felt sure of his election. However, Mr. Murphy did not canvass for votes, and let his defeat go un-noticed.

Mr. U. A. Buchner, another lawyer, made a very good run, and increased his popularity by the large number of votes he polled.

Nine of the aldermen are Conservatives and three are Liberals.
