It is interesting to note what the ourts, such as the assizes just concluded, cost the county. The jurors are paid \$2 for each day they are in attendance, County Treasurer McEvoy ras just paid out in cash \$136 90 to the grand jurors and \$588 50 to the petit urors. The constables drew a total of 165 20, making a grand total of \$890 30. This is not large compared with what has been paid on other occasions especially in the days when the jury lists were much larger. Mr. McEvoy has paid out as much as \$1,000 to jurymen, alone, on some occasions. The names "grand" and "petit," as applied to juries are not understood by nany people.
