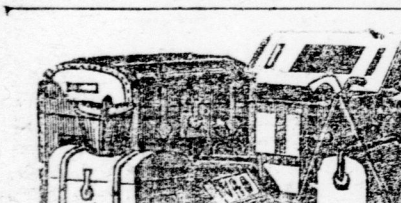

TO PAY THE BILLS**

No. 1 Committee Sends Account of Teamsters Who Worked on Wreck to Him.

No. 1 committee held its regular meeting yesterday afternoon, but there was not a quorum present, so a minority report was brought in. Several times this year all the members of the committee have not been present.

The committee recommended that the bills, aggregating \$172 50, for teamsters, etc., who worked on the Crystal Hall disaster be sent to Mr. W. J. Reid for payment. This was done on the advice of Mr. T. G. Meredith, city solicitor.

Mr. C. W. Wonnacott, of St. Thomas asked to be relieved of a fine of \$10 and costs imposed in this city for driving an automobile without a light. It was found that Mr. Wonnacott was technically guilty, but there were mitigating circumstances, and the committee recommended that all above \$5 be remitted to Mr. Wonnacott.

The asylum account was presented and ordered to be paid. Several patients being paid for by the city will be allotted to the different townships legally responsible for their keep. The usual number of accounts were passed.

Those present were Ald. Beattie, chairman, Ald. Stevely and Secretary Pope.

**BOARD APPROVED
HOSPITAL PLANS**

Will Call for Figures at Once—Many Other Matters Discussed.

No. 2 committee met last evening, and looked over the plans of the isolation hospital as prepared by Mr. Vic Mitchell. They are entirely satisfactory, and it was decided that the engineer be asked to prepare specifications, and that tenders be called for the building of the hospital. There was no discussion re the Mitchell incident.

Mr. Charles W. Dill tendered for the building of manholes and sewer on Rectory street and the Hamilton road. He asked \$1,859, and 58 cents per lineal foot for side drains. His was the only tender, and the contract was awarded to him on motion of Ald. Saunders.

Engineer Graydon advised the committee that the only outlet for a sewer on Ingleside Place was into the drain on Ridout street south which empties into the river at Victoria bridge. He thought that it was not advisable to have a lot of sewage dumped into the river at this point, as for six months in the year the river there is practically dry, and the sewage property was subdivided about twelve houses have been erected, all of which will empty their sewage into the proposed sewer on Ingleside Place.

It was decided to inform the petitioners that the sewer they demand could not be built.

The Creek on Egerton.
Engineer Graydon estimated that it would cost the city \$875 to tile the creek on Egerton street between Mary and Dundas street.

Superintendent Nixon of the Grand Trunk informed the engineer that he would take the matter up of tiling the creek from the car shops to Mary street.

Carling's Creek.
Engineer Graydon estimated that the cost of tiling Carling's Creek from St. George street would be \$4,000. All the residents and property-owners are willing to pay the expense, thus securing a lease through their property.

Ald. Cooper moved that the work be done according to the local improvement bylaw, the cost to be assessed against properties benefited.

It was decided to lay the matter over until the next meeting of No. 2 committee.

Mr. Alex. Harvey asked that a sidewalk be laid on Talbot street, between Oxford and Sydenham streets, in front of his property. He was willing to pay for it, and get the money back next year.

Ald. Saunders moved that the sidewalk be laid. There was no need of having the money advanced.

Mr. George Wells wanted to buy or lease the part of Trafalgar street, from Matland street west, abutting the river, which he has cultivated for some years past.

The committee had no power to either lease it or sell it. He was informed that the street was a street, and he would have to open it.

Mr. C. D. Burdick, of the Helena Costume Company, applied for permission to run a steam pipe across King street to the billiard parlors and crockery warehouse across the way for heating purposes. The request was granted, provided work is done to the satisfaction of Engineer Graydon.

New Sewers.
Ald. Cooper moved that the sewer on Tecumseh avenue and all other sewers advertised for, be initiated at once, and that tenders be called for.

Those present were: Ald. Matthews (chairman), Saunders, Cooper, Rose, Mayor Judd, City Engineer Graydon, and Secretary Bell.
