It is this class of immigration that the Government has encouraged. It has placed a watch at the ports of entry to keep out undesirable, and the parole system removes those who may have escaped the vigilance of the officers.

One for Hanna.

"In connection with this matter I desire to criticize the figures of Mr. Hanna, to which I referred some moments ago," said Mr. Murphy. "Mr. Hanna in his delightful speech classes English, Irish and Scotch as foreign-born, although they were born under the same flag as our own. He also classes as foreign-born a man who might have lived in Canada 30, 40 or 50 years, although the immigration policy of the present Government has only been in operation a few years. This is neither fair nor honest and Mr. Hanna knows it. Mr. Borden has endeavored to explain away Mr. Hanna's mischievous and misleading statements, but Mr. Hanna still remains unrepentant. I will show you how such criticism as that works out. At the Ottawa convention of the Conservative party, one of the candidates for the nomination was an Englishman. He was ridiculed for seeking the place and the reason alleged against his candidature was the fact that he was not born in Canada. That is the logical result of Mr. Hanna's criticism. That is not the policy of the Liberal party. Give every man a chance, like the Scotch stonemason, Alexander Mackenzie, who rose to the highest office in the gift of Canadians. I say let every man have a chance, no matter where he was born. That is our policy."

Mr. Murphy dealt with the fables called scandals and some length, exploding all of them.

"These fables or so-called scandals, are old friends in new guise. We had them in 1900 and in 1904, but they are no longer doing service. After this election we will hear no more of them. They will be relegated to the political attic along with Tupper's predictions in 1900, and 1904."

Mr. Murphy charged that the country had to pay many thousands of dollars because of the obstruction tactics of the Opposition. Complaint had been made because the contracts had been extended, and when new Scoters were called for these were much higher than the cost would have been if the first contract had been extended.

The present age tended most strongly to become material and sceptic in all things, and there is the greatest need of evangelism everywhere. Faith is the great quality needed in soul winning
