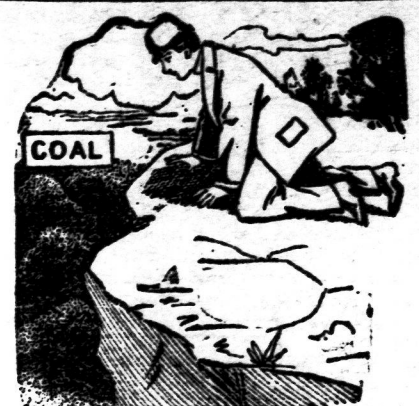

NEARLY ONE HUNDRED CHICKENS STOLEN

J. C. Sanderson, of the L. and P.
S. R. Gravel Road, Suffers
Big Loss.

St. Thomas, June 9.—J. C. Sanderson, fruit grower and nursery man, on the London and Port Stanley gravel road, just south of the city, was visited by chicken thieves last Thursday night and relieved of the responsibility of caring for about 80 or 85 young birds which were still in the brooders. About 40 or 45 of the missing birds had arrived at that stage of maturity when they are in brisk demand by consumers at the highest prices.

Neither Mr. Sanderson nor any of his household heard the slightest noise or disturbance during the night and knew nothing of the burglarious visit until morning. The dog, which ordinarily is looser, by some chance was locked in the barn that night for the first time.

Tuesday night the chicken thieves paid a second visit to Mr. Sanderson, evidently encouraged by the success of their previous effort. They came comparatively early—about 10:30 or 11 o'clock. Finding the brooders empty, they visited the chicken house and attempted to pry the staple off the lock. This time they became alarmed and made good their escape without securing any more fowl.

Mr. Sanderson is advertising the offer of a reward of \$25 for any information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty parties.

Under New Hampshire's new law governing the use of automobiles on public highways, which went into effect on Jan. 1, the registration fee is increased from \$3 to \$10, and the speed limit in compact portion of a town or city is increased from eight to ten miles an hour, while in the rural districts of the state the rate is 25 miles an hour, instead of only 20.

Well-Known Local Bank Manager
Is Transferred to Queen
City.

Mr. P. W. D. Brodrick, who for twenty years has been manager of the Molsons Bank in this city, has been transferred to Toronto, and will leave shortly to take charge of the large branch in the Queen City.

PARENTS READY TO COMPROMISE

Aberdeen School Damages Claims
Are Again in the Lime-
light.

LOOKS LIKE SETTLEMENT

It Appears That the City Is Willing to Meet the Parents Half Way in the Matter.

At the meeting of the board of education held yesterday afternoon, H. W. Ashley asked the trustees to reopen the question of damages to the children injured in the accident at Aberdeen School a year or so ago.

It will be remembered that the parents of several of the children applied for damages. The board made an offer to them, which they refused. Suits were threatened, and City Solicitor Meredith advised the board not to pay the money, as the city was not liable, he said.

Now many of the parents are willing to accept the offer made by the board, and the application of yesterday was to reopen the case.

Dr. Wyckoff suggested that the claimants be offered the same as they were before.
Trustee Gunn thought that was the proper suggestion, as the people were poor and needed the money. However, it was decided to refer the matter to No. 1 committee, who will settle the claims.

Public Schools.
Inspector Meadows reported that the enrollment in the public schools for the month of May was as follows: Public school, 5,014; kindergarten, 347. This is an increase of 81 in the public school, and 45 in the kindergarten over May, 1909. The average attendance shows a decrease of 128 for the month, due to the prevalence of measles and whooping cough.

The fees for the departmental examinations amounted to \$806, of which the board receives \$320, and the department \$486.

NURSES RECEIVE THEIR DIPLOMAS

Brilliant Function Last Night in
St. Peter's Parish Hall.

ST. JOSEPH'S GRADUATES

Good Advice Given the Young Ladies,
Who Are Classed as the Physi-
cian's Second Self.

The new Parish Hall of St. Peter's was the scene of a brilliant gathering last night when the graduation exercises of the class of 1910 of St. Joseph's Hospital Training School for Nurses were held, and the following young lady graduates received their medals and diplomas: Misses Howitt, Harrison, Boyle, Flynn, Otto, Potheringham, Kenny, Hargitt, James and Breen.

Hundreds of citizens and friends of the graduates gathered to witness the presentation of the medals and diplomas, and all sides surprise and delight were expressed at the elegance of the new hall, which is unquestionably one of the finest edifices of its kind in Canada.

The spacious auditorium where the exercises were held was filled to its utmost capacity. The graduating nurses took their places on the stage at the end of the hall, which had been transformed for the occasion by magnificent decorations of white and yellow bunting, banded on both sides by gold walls of yellow chrysanthemums. The effect was one of great beauty, and harmonized prettily with the uniforms of the nurses.

Bishop Is Ill.
Owing to a heavy cold from which he is suffering, His Lordship is unable to attend the exercises and give the address for which he was on the programme.

Rev. Father Aylward presided, and congratulated the nurses on having graduated in such a brilliant manner. In speaking about the new hall he stated that it was at any time at the disposal of those who are working to help the London Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

Mayor Beattie thanked Father Aylward heartily for this kind offer.
The Valedictory.

Miss L. Flynn delivered the valedictory, and spoke of the pleasure the graduates feel in having arrived at the stage where they really begin their life work. The training they have received, she said, had been most thorough and one and all wished to acknowledge their debt of gratitude to their instructors and to the medical men. The relations of the nurses with all had been most pleasant during the four years of their training, and all would have a warm spot in their hearts always for the people of London.

She made feeling reference to the death of Dr. John D. Wilson.

The young ladies at the conclusion of the valedictory received their diplomas from Father Aylward, and then their places again on the platform.

Deluged With Flowers.
Immediately they were deluged with immense bouquets, the flowers being presented to them by ten little girls, Misses Margaret, Johnston, Rose, Collins, Margaret Corcoran, Vera White, Rita Mullins, Katie Murphy, Madeline Kew, Mary Quigley, Mary Webb and Dorothy Mullins.

The little girls were all beautifully dressed in white and wore diadems of lilies of the valley in their hair. They marched in singing a pretty flower song to an orchestral accompaniment, and after a cleverly executed drill, laid the flowers in the nurses' arms. There were so many bouquets

S., from Pictou, N. S., to Harrington Harbor, Canadian Labrador, by C. G. S. Minto, in order that the Labrador folk should receive the seed in time for this spring's planting."

"Thanks are likewise due to W. J. Reid, of London, Ont., who gratuitously set apart a section on his farm and is growing a special variety of potato to be used as seed on the Labrador."

Miss Edith B. Mayou, formerly lady superintendent at Victoria Hospital, wrote Mr. Hamilton recently expressing her entire approval of the work being done, and stated that she would seize all opportunities for sending seeds along the coast, so that all may reap the benefit of London's generosity.

A Good Work.
From the April number, "Among the Deep Sea Fishers."

The attention of the Canadian Minister of Agriculture has, at the instance of Mr. Emery B. Hamilton, of London, been drawn by the Hon. Senator Coffey, to the efforts being made, partic-

ularly at Harrington, under Miss Mayou's supervision, to grow vegetables and flowers in Labrador. The question is one of great economic importance, and later on it is quite possible some financial assistance may be given, but in view of the recent substantial grant for the reindeer fund, the minister does not see his way to asking Parliament for funds at present. The department of agriculture will, however, send to Mr. Hamilton information which may be of use, and will also give advice on points which may arise. Mr. Hamilton, to whose expert knowledge the substantial progress already made is largely due, is making further study of the conditions, and the result of further efforts under his guidance will be awaited with much interest.

Prince Rudolf Leichtenstein, first lord chamberlain to the imperial court, who died several months ago, left a mysterious legacy to the Vienna Academy of Science, in the form of a sealed case of documents.
