# CITY BOUND TO PAY \$30,000 IF HYDRO **COMMISSION INSISTS**

City Solicitor Thinks Hearing Should Be Reopened at Toronto.

ALD. ASHPLANT SAYS IT'S "HIGH AND MIGHTY"

Ald. Richter Again Refers to "Outrageous Conclusions"-Want Independent Expert.

The city will have to pay the hydroelectric commission \$30,000 for street lighting in the opinion of City Solicitor Meredith given Monday evening at the meeting of the special committee appointed to discuss the matter. However, Mr. Meredith will approach the hydro-electric commission in an attempt to re-open the case, and then Ald. Richter, with an expert's advice, will present the city's side to the argument.

Armed with statute books, Mr Meredith read extract after tract, explaining the connection

commission have approved of the rates o be charged for street lighting," he explained. "The city is bound by that act to pay the price asked by the rater commissioners for street lightng. All you can do is to go to the nydro-electric commission, say that he rates have been approved by the ommission without first hearing the city's side, and ask them to re-open the matter. Certain of the members contended that the association should sent your side of it. Whether or not they will do so, is a matter for them to consider. It is possible that you might issue a mandamus to compel them to re-open the case, but I have doubt if the commission are aproached that they will hear your

A One-Sided Arrangement. "The hydro-electric commission in this matter is in a somewhat analogous position with the Dominion railway commission. taken. "It is as I thought all the time," said Ald. Wright. "In council and com-mittee I have stated that when the matter was finally settled we would have to pay the price. It looks that way to me now, after Mr. Meredith's report.

"The commission may close our legal rights,' said Ald. Richter. "That does not settle the question as to whether not we are getting full value for the money we are expending."

beaten up. Beutler not only knew many people but was well known in every popul centre in America on account of the numerous clients whom he served. He was a little, gray-haired, gray-mouse tached man, but in spite of his slender form had great powers of endurance, and in some of his cases performed almost unbelievable feats of endurance in pursuing men and evidence.
