

APPREHENSION FELT FOR EMPEROR'S HEALTH

Austria's Ruler, Suffering From Catarrh, Has Fairly Good Night. [Canadian Press.]

Vienna, Austria, April 20 .- "The Emperor Francis Joseph passed a fairly comfortable night. His health otherwise not satisfactory." This was the official bulletin issued at the Palace of Schoenbrunn today. It was also stated that his majesty rose at his usual hour and tran-sacted official business.

The guarded language of the official oulletin caused apprehension in Vienna that the Emperor's condition was graver than was admitted by his physicians. Fear was expressed in court circles that inless the catarrh from which he is suffering diminishes within a short time, serious complications may develop. 
Shown Historic Massle Place, Which Estate Was Granted By George III.
