Woodstock and London Juniors Meet Here Friday

INDIANAPOLIS FEDS IN RECEIVER'S HANDS

Meeting To Be Held Today To Sell Out Franchise.

CLUB HAS LOST MONEY Over \$75,000 Indebtedness To Face—Gilmore Says League Prospects Bright

INDIANAPOLIS, March 22.—Alleging that the Indianapolis Federal League Baseball Club is insolvent, Pliny W. Bartholomew, former judge of the superior court, and a stockholder, brought suit today to place the club in the hands of a receiver. He alleges that in addition to indebtedness of \$75,000, the club is indebted to the stockholders for the non-payment of 6 per cent on \$40,000 worth of stock.

CHICAGO, March 22.—Prospects for setting the circuit troubles of the Federal League were bright today, according to a statement by James A. Gilmore, president of the league. A meeting of the stockholders of the Indianapolis club will be held at Indianapolis tomorrow, said Mr. Gilmore. "They will determine whether to accept the offer of the league to buy the franchise, if they conclude to sell, we will be able to go ahead with our schedule meeting without sitting for a decision in the Kansas City injunction case."

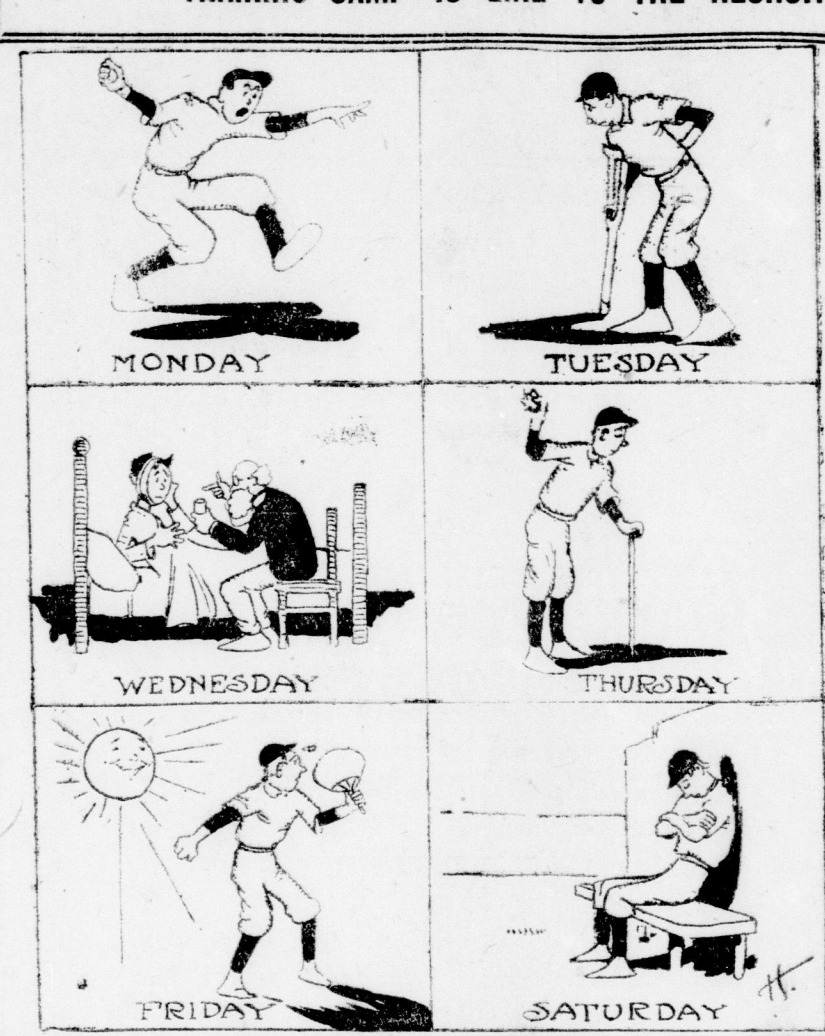

SENATORS FADED AFTER FIRST PERIOD UNITED STATES SETS TENNIS DATES

Vancouver Won First Game For Stanley Cup by Playing in Brilliant Form.

Vancouver, B. C., March 23.—Vancouver, champions of the Pacific Coast, defeated the Ottawa team in the first game of the world's series last night by 6 to 2. Playing in brilliant form from start to finish and rushing the Senators hard in the last two periods, Vancouver was easily the better team, and are warm favorites to win the championship in three straight games.

It was the fastest game ever played in the West. Ottawa surprised the crowd with end-to-end rushes in the first period, which was thrilling and replete with sensational work. Playing under western rules has handicapped the Senators, but they gave a display that was a credit to the National Hockey Association, and after twenty minutes of the fastest hockey ever served up in any city of the Coast League circuit, they led the Senators by a 2 to 0 score.

The women's national championship goes to Philadelphia for the week of the shifting of the national championships from Newport to the West Side Tennis Club at Forest Hills, Long Island. This brought about a general rearrangement of local dates. Owing to this fact also the executive committee took the New York State championship from the Crescent Athletic Club, of Brooklyn, and gave it to the Yahnudale Golf Club, of Ellicott.

Both teams made numerous changes in the final period, but Vancouver increased their lead, McKay scoring, after grading the Ottawa defense.

The play was clean throughout, although the checking was close and hard. Art Ross was "in bad" with the western fans by his aggressive work, and drew a penalty in the first period. Neighbor starred for Vancouver along with "Cyclone" Taylor.

Duford was the only player on the Ottawa team who played up to form. Broadbent was bottled up, and was unable to get through the Vancouver defense.

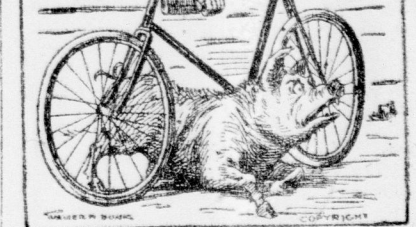
