WOMAN CHOSEN BY TEACHERS AS THEIR PRESIDENT OF YEAR

Miss Tolhurst Elected at the Annual Convention.

CURRICULUM CRITICIZED

Dr. Coleman Says It Contains Great Deal of "Useless Lumber."

The honor of being president of the London Teachers' Association for the coming year has fallen to a woman member, Mrs. C. H. Coleman, who was chosen for this office, to succeed Principal G. F. Rogers of the Collegiate Institute, when the election of the officers of the annual meeting of the association in the Iyerson School today. Other officers elected were: Vice-president, G. E. Copeland; secretary-treasurer, Miss E. Knott (re-elected); committee, the officers, with Inspectors Edwards and Sullivan, and Messrs. Cameron, Newhouse, and Misses Skelton, Rudd and Evans; Strathcona trust committee, Inspector C. B. Edwards (re-elected), Messrs. Morris and Galpin, and Miss Andrews.

The association decided to forward a resolution to the Ontario Educational Association asking that the question of a geography for Grades V and VI be taken up.

It was also decided to forward an expression of the appreciation of the association along with a Christmas gift to three of the members who are engaged in overseas service, Miss Minnie Craig, and Lieuts. Galpin and Whieble.

The program feature of the forenoon was the third of the delightful and illuminating series of addresses delivered during the convention by Professor Coleman of Queen's University.

"Knowledge," he told the audience of pedagogues before him, "is not a patchwork quilt, but a seamless vestment. I say this to you to save you from the distraction of regarding as your chief duty in life the transforming of your selves into whirlwind fanes, passing from one task to another. Work at the highest is always of a piece."

The subject of the lecture as announced on the program was "Recent Aspects of Geography Teaching." Dr. Coleman recalled the old method of learning definitions which was at best "the irreducible minimum" as far as conveying information was concerned. The old idea in teaching geography was to insist upon the learning of a number of capes and lakes, etc., for examination purposes.

A Revolution.
"There has been a veritable revolution in ideas in regard to teaching and the speaker, 'not only in teaching as a situation, but in teaching from the standpoint of governing, organizing and in the equipment and architecture of schools."

The modern aspects of geography he summed up as follows:
(1). Scientific. Geography is a science in the sense that it aims at the complete setting forth of the relations between earth and man. "In this connection, it was emphasized that it is impossible under elementary school auspices to acquire competence in any study undertaken. One great defect of the system is that it is so desperately complete," was a comment of the speaker.

Furthermore, the view was advanced that there is a "tremendous lot of useless lumber in the school curriculum of the present day." Instead of elimination, Dr. Coleman proposed "sublimation" or co-ordination of the studies as agriculture and nature study with geography.

The Sensible Side.
In the second place, the "sensible" side of teaching geography was impressed, the taking into account of the child nature.

In the third place, the human side should be considered, the thinking of the influence of environment upon a people. "If I do not believe," said Dr. Coleman, "that the war was caused by geographic conditions, but that geographic conditions contributed to it, I do not think that it is entirely due to Providence that large cities are usually situated on bodies of water. These are things to be considered from the human standpoint of geography teaching."

In the fourth place, the interpretative side was dwelt upon, the co-relating of geography to all other studies of the curriculum.

A number took part in the discussion which followed, offering suggestions arising from their own experience.

Judgment was reserved until Friday next by Mayor Stevenson and Henry Macklin, J.P., in police court today in the case of Lyman Palmer, who was charged under the Ontario Temperance act with two offences.

The first offence charged with that of keeping liquor for sale at the Brunswick House on Tuesday, October 31st.

The second charge was that of drunkenness, both charges being tried together today.

Patrolman Thomas Noonan testified that he had been called to the Brunswick House, and there he found Palmer with a small leather grip.

He noticed that he was intoxicated, and asked him for the key to the grip. Palmer informed him that he had no key, and witness said he then took him to the police station, where the grip was opened by Sgt. Birrell, who found a bottle of whiskey and a \$2 bill in the satchel. Palmer was then searched and locked up.

A Standard Hotel.
License Inspector J. E. Keenleyside was called to verify the fact that the Brunswick Hotel was licensed under the Ontario Temperance act as a "Standard Hotel."

Sgt. Birrell testified that he had opened the grip at the police station and had found the bottle of whiskey and \$2 bill inside.

"Do you know Palmer well? That is, do you know him when he is drunk and when sober?" asked Chief Williams.

"Yes, I know him—mostly drunk," replied Sgt. Birrell.

Cross-examined by W. R. Meredith, counsel for Palmer, witness described the condition of defendant on the day in question as drunk. He appeared wild-eyed and talked wildly, and assumed a careless attitude, testified Sgt. Birrell in describing Palmer's condition.

Sgt. Macdonald testified that he was at the police station when Palmer was brought in, and that he appeared to him like a man who had been drinking.

FRIENDS OF TANCREADE OUT WITH PETITION FOR SENTENCE COMMUTATION

Mayor and Bishop Fallon Have Signed Document Asking for Leniency.

Petitions to the governor-general of Canada, praying for commutation of the death sentence passed by Mr. Justice Lennox on Mike Tancreade on Friday last, are now in circulation, and efforts are being made to get a large number of signatures.

The petitions are being placed in circulation by Messrs. Cusolito and Sansone, who have taken a deep interest in Tancreade throughout his trial, and particularly since he has been sentenced to be hanged on January 23rd next.

Many citizens, say the circulators, who are averse to capital punishment in Canada, will attach their signatures for that reason.

The first signatures attached to the petition are those of Mayor H. A. Stevenson and Bishop Fallon.

Those wishing to sign will find petitions in several business places, or are requested to communicate with either Messrs. Cusolito or Sansone.

Following is the text of the petition: To His Excellency the Governor-General: The undersigned petitioners humbly pray for the commutation of the sentence of death for murder passed on Mike Tancreade, who is aged 53 years, on the seventh day of November, 1916, by Mr. Justice Lennox, the trial judge, at the city of London.

That it was shown that there was no quarrel between the deceased and the condemned man upon the day of the shooting or that there ever was. The deceased was not on unfriendly terms with the condemned man and had never been.

COURTS MAY HAVE TO DECIDE CLAIM CASES

City Mixed Up in Filder Construction Company's Troubles.

The city will probably have a lawsuit on its hands in straightening out the claims against the Filder Construction Company.

This firm was given the contracts for various sewers and other works this year, but became involved in financial difficulties, with the result that the city had to take over some of the work, the William street sewer being the most important, and complete it.

Quite a sum of money has been retained by the city treasurer, by number of claims have been presented.

William Buchanan, the supply man, has a claim for material amounting to about \$100. A number of other claims for labor, etc., have also come to the notice of City Treasurer Bell. The city's claims come first, of course, and Mr. Buchanan wants the position of preferred creditor.

"It looks to me as if the courts will have to decide," said Controller John M. Moore. "That will be the only equitable way. It will be some days before the exact sums due the city will be figured out."

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
