SMUTS' STATEMENT

That Empire Ceased To Exist in August, 1917, True, Says Newspaper.

LONDON, Dec. 17 .- (Canadian Associated Press Cable.)-The Manchester Guardian, discussing the future of the empire, with special reference to the assertion of Gen. Smuts, that the British Empire ceased to exist August, 1917, says the statement such a condensed form is startling. Full reports will no doubt considerably qualify it, but his statement is perfectly true as a direct means of driving home the fact that changes wrought by the war in the status and relations of the Dominions have rung the death knell of such concerted aggressive imperialism as the South Afri-

can Nationalists fear. The Guardian proceeds to argue that Downing Street authority in the Dominions is now reduced to a shadow.

"In law the ultimate appeal from the ghest courts in the Dominions is still the privy council, but the delay and typense which the systems involved are aroused in Canada and elsewhere an active logical agitation for ending it, which before long must gain its way. A minor but not insignificant symptom of the same tendency is the decision by Canada that she wishes the creation by the crown of hereditary titles to cease."

Divergent Lines. The war has forced the pace of im-erial development in two divergent nes, the Guardian continues. It thinks the inneyation of Dominion ministers sitting as executive members of the British cabinet, although a necessary and valuable step, has given rise to much confused thinking, for it has led steps and written of class to dreem of a permanent executive, and perhaps even of an imperial parliament, to assume the liabilities nd obligations for the empire as

whole.
"To realize how little such a plan would meet the trend of thought overseas we have but to add to Gen. Smuts' speech such recent incidents as Borden's successful assertion of the Canadian Parliament's 2ht to debate the peace treaty or Hughes' declaration that he was irrevocably opposed to what is called imperial federation." that he was irrevocably opposed to what is called imperial federation."

The Guardian finds in the Dominions having signed the peace treaty as separate states, and having separate representation in the League of Nations, an undermining of the central authority in its remaining citadel, that of foreign affairs. the new relationship on which the British people are embarking, the need for common counsel and advice will be even greater than before, but it will be a conference between nations of equal status in a sisterhood," the paper concludes

MONTREAL PUTS UP BARS AGAINST ALL FROM ONT. AND U.S.

All Travelers From This Province Must Have Vaccination Certificates.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17 .- "Commencing today, the whole province of Ontario is placed under guarantine so far as Montreal is concerned." This decision, which was taken today by the municipal authorities, is now law and henceforth and until further notice all travelers from Ontario to this city
must comply with the demands of the
Montreal Board of Health.
This also applies to all persons coming to Montreal from the United States id passing through the province of

ortario. The official preclamation issued toay by E. R. Decary, chairman of the
dministrative committee of the city
of Montreal, is as follows:
"By order of the administrative comnission and of the board of health:
"I. The whole province of Ontario is

"2. Travelers from any part of the "2. Travelers from any part of the province of Ontario to Montreal are required to produce before leaving the train on its arrival here, a certificate showing that they have been successfully vaccinated within less than seven years, failing which they will be de-

years, falling which they will be de-tained and forced to return to Ontario by the next train.

"3. The above decision applies to people traveling from Montreal any place whatsoever in the province of Ontario, whether to spend their Christ-mas holidays, or on business, and also to people coming from the United States to Montreal and passing through the province of Ontario. the province of Ontario.

"4. The above decision is in force from today until further notice.

40,000,000 IN DANGER OF STARVATION IN **EUROPEAN COUNTRIES**

Herbert Hoover Points Out Deplorable Food Situation Overseas.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Starvation faces from fifteen to twenty million persons in Central Europe outside Germany unless "some quick means can be discovered for their assistance," Herbert Hoover, former food administrator, said today in a formal statement. Unless relief is quickly furnished he predicts a breakdown of stable government in the countries affected and "creation of another cesspool like Russla."

To meet the situation Mr. Hoover proposed that the "great surplus of wheat and flour" held by the grain corporation be sold on credit to Poland, Finland, Austria and other nations of Central Europe. The grain corporation, he said, could extend the credits out of the capital it already possessed without a special appropriation by Congress. without a special appropriation by Congress.

"The question of export of breadstuffs in this particular case," said the former food administrator, "does not influence the price or supply to the American people. It is purely a question as to whether out of the material which we will export in any event we should give credits in order to prevent starvation on a wholesale scale, or, on the other hand, to deal only with those who can pay on the nail."


