

CITY AND COUNTY HOLD GET-TOGETHER CONFERENCE HERE

Middlesex Farmers Meet With London Chamber of Commerce.

The closer knitting together of the city and the country was the primary object of a representative meeting held in the Tecumseh House on Saturday afternoon. The meeting was convened under the auspices of the London Chamber of Commerce and a number of prominent agriculturists from the unding district attended and took

J. S. Laughton, London, and said that the meeting had been called for the purpose of organizing an agricultural section in connection with he Chamber of Commerce, and by this neans to bring about closer co-operation between businessmen in the city and the people of the rural districts. Nearly everyone agreed that there was a great need for such co-operation, and was for the meeting to have a ful cussion on the matter, and try and arrive at some practical step towards the object in view. The chairman then called for an expression of opinion of the various aspects of the question.

Along Excellent Lines.
Will Bogue. Lambeth, thought that this movement was working along excellent lines. It would be a very good thing if the urban men and the suburban men would get together, and work in conjunction for the comm good of the community. It was high time that there was a better under-standing between the two. "All the scandal does not lie in the city, nor do all the profiteers live in the country," said Mr. Bogue. 
