HARDING WILL NOT MUZZLE U. S. CABINET

Makes Known Stand in Answer To Senator Capper's Attack On Weeks.

FAVORS FREE SPEECH

Will Not Reprimand War Secretary For Criticizing Volstead Law.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—President Harding feels that every member of his cabinet has a right to express himself on any subject without necessarily committing the administration to his view.

This attitude, made known at the White House, is regarded as the administration's answer to the recent utterance of Senator Capper of Kansas, who suggested that Secretary of War Weeks ought to resign because

of his speech suggesting modification of the Volstead law and criticizing the direct primary.

The president has noted the speeches in Congress and elsewhere commenting on Secretary Weeks' addresses, but has not felt that Mr. Weeks was expressing any official administration opinion, but was giving simply his own comments.

Mr. Weeks, as a former member of the United States Senate from Massachusetts and before that as a prominent member of the house of representatives, has had the opportunity to make his own observations of modern tendencies in government, and although his speeches have aroused a storm of protest there is every evidence now that Mr. Harding will not take him to task for them even though he may disagree with Mr. Weeks.

For Convention System. It so happens that on the question of the ill-effects of the direct primary system, President Harding is in accord with his secretary of war. Mr. Harding has openly advocated a return to the convention system of nominations. As for modification of the dry laws, the president hasn't discussed that phase of prohibition at all, except to insist that he favored rigid enforcement of present statutes.

Senator Capper of Kansas, however, has accomplished something by his attack on Mr. Weeks. He has forced the White House to take a view and that of the administration. Sometimes the members of a presidential cabinet take offense if it is pointed out that they are not spokesmen of the administration to which they belong. In one case at least, that of Secretary of War Weeks, a resignation followed the inference that a member of the cabinet might hold one view and the administration approve the adoption of another policy in Congress.

Wilson's Viewpoint. Former President Wilson always sought to have his cabinet members confine their utterances to things that would not embarrass the administration. Under the present regime, Will Hays, who until recently was postmaster-general, used to take his speeches to the White House and read them to Mr. Harding, so as to make sure that he was reflecting accurately the administration view.

The president doesn't feel that he should act as censor over the utterances of his cabinet officers. If they wish to bring their speeches to him beforehand he gives them the benefit of his counsel, but the Harding idea is that a democratic system of government is best developed by permitting freedom of speech inside as well as outside the official circle.

The presumption is that Mr. Harding does not mean to be taken literally, but that his idea embraces only the discussion of subjects which are not under consideration officially. It is not deemed probable that the president would sanction, for instance, speeches favoring the bonus by his secretary of the treasury while he opposed the grant of a bonus.

RESPOND TO EARLY MORNING ALARM. Firemen responded to an alarm from 260 Richmond street about 1 o'clock Tuesday morning, where an overheated chimney ignited some wallpaper in the home of R. Buffey. Chemical extinguishers were used to quench the sparks in a slowly smoldering wall. The damage was very slight.
