

Beattymen Now Tied For First Place After Taking Double-Header From Aces

FIGHTING TECUMSEHS BEAT SAGINAW TWICE

Englishman Holds Aces To Two Hits in Opening 2-0 Victory, While Indians Clout Way To 5-4 Win in Second.

Saginaw, Aug. 12.—The Beattymen, playing more aggressive ball all day, took both games of the double-header from the slumping Aces today, 2 to 0 and 5 to 4, and swept the series. In the first game, Englishman allowed the Aces only two hits, and bested Frank Matuzak in a great pitching duel. In the second, London bunched his hits to better advantage than the Aces. Both teams hit the ball much harder than the score would indicate in this game, but had no luck in placing the solid swats. Englishmen had the Aces completely subdued. He was inclined to be wild, passing five men, but he was invincible in the pinches.

Three times the Aces had a runner on second base with only one out, but could not come through with the hit needed to tally. One run would have tied up the count at any stage from the fourth to the ninth, as London's margin was a solitary marker until the final inning. It was an unearned run at that.

Nelson led off in the fourth with a pop fly just out of reach of Gerald and Orme, and got safely to second when Vermilyea dropped Gerald's peg to the bag, that had him out by ten feet had the Ace second-sacker held the ball. Sandquist walked and Baker sacrificed them both along. Matuzak, it seemed, had time to cut off Nelson at third, but chose to make the play at first. Gehring sent a long sacrifice fly out to Cozington in right field to score Nelson. Kerman fled out to the end of the line.

The Aces never really threatened again until the ninth, when Baker drew a pass to open. Matuzak missed Gehring's rap through the box, and the ball went through to center field for a hit. Then Kerman pushed a bunt past Matuzak to fill the bases, and Englishman drove a long sacrifice fly to center for the run. Stimpson fouled out and Tice forced Kerman, Gerald making a great play behind second on the ball.

The Aces got going in the second inning of the game. With one out Baker got a double on a short hit to right on which Cozington tried for a shoestring catch and failed. Gehring fled to Orme. Kerman hit a double against the right field fence, scoring Baker. Matuzak pitched him to third. Gerald kicked Nelson's roller and Tice scored. Sandquist tripped to right center for two more runs. Then Danny McPhie went to work, fanned Baker and Gehring and got Kerman by covering first base for Dowagiac, who went over to toward second for the ball and made a fine play out of it.

The Aces were unable to break through for a run until the fourth. Vermilyea and Dowagiac hit safely with one out and Vermilyea scored while the Tee infield was trying for a double play on McPhie's hit, but the pitcher beat the throw to first, so the run counted.

In the fifth with one out, Orme and Cozington singled. Tice popped out to short, but Hammond doubled to left and Baker threw low to Beatty on Vermilyea's rap and the ball got through the London manager. Three runs resulted. Vermilyea was perched on second. Kerman batted for Dowagiac, but couldn't help, rolling to Sandquist for the final out.

SGT. MAJ. HAWKINS SETS NEW RECORD

Wins City of Toronto Match With 119 Out of Possible 120.

Toronto, Aug. 12.—Sgt. Major W. A. Hawkins, 48th Highlanders, Toronto, king's prize winners in 1913, were made life members of the Ontario Rifle Association at the semi-annual meeting of the association at the Long Branch ranges today in honor of their prowess as marksmen at the Bisley meeting.
In the O. R. A. competition today Sgt. Major Hawkins made a long Branch record when he won the City of Toronto match, and he has the record of having won every rifle match of the O. R. A. He was 3 points ahead of the second man, and got the O. R. A. gold medal and \$25. Lieut. J. A. Steele, Wellington Rifles, Guelp, came second with 68, winning the bronze medal and \$20, and Sgt. G. H. Myers, G. G. F. G., Ottawa, was third with 65, winning \$15.
The Canadian National Exhibition team match for rifles was won by the Hamilton C. I. This carries with it a challenge cup and seven silver medals. The York Rangers were second with 265, Hamilton Technicians third with 260, and Brantford C. I. fourth with 256. The match consists of seven rounds snap shooting at 200 yards, and seven rounds deliberate at 300 yards.

The Duke of Cornwall and York match, consisting of seven rounds at 200 and 800 yards was won by Pte. J. Irvine, G. G. F. G., Ottawa, with a score of 67 out of a possible 70. Major R. C. Rowe, Wellington Rifles, Guelp, came second with 66, winning the bronze medal and \$20, and Sgt. G. H. Myers, G. G. F. G., Ottawa, was third with 65, winning \$15.

GROWING PAINS.

Knotty Lee is coaching baseball at Kingston, but the organizer of the old Canadian League and parent circuit of the present Mint League is really spending most of his time formulating plans for a Canadian circuit. Lee would revive the old Canadian League, leaving out Ottawa and Peterboro. Or, again, if four good cities could be lined up in the east with Ottawa and Montreal as two of them an eight-team circuit, made up of four teams from the western end of Ontario, with London and Hamilton as two of them, may receive consideration.

What classification the new league would take would be another matter to be fought out in the long winter months. It is doubtful if class B ball would be attempted. This is the case of ball the customers would vote for, but unless salaries take a drop it's too high for the cities which are now prospective franchise holders.

One of the big troubles with the Mint League right now is the salary limit. The Mint may be playing, as lots of experts claim, nearer class A ball than class B. That's open to argument, but the salaries of some of the club certainly hover around the figures reached in class A ranks.

One manager of a present Mint League team who piloted a team in the old Central League, said he took second place with a club the monthly payroll of which was well under \$2,000.

A ROOKIE RULE.

A rookie rule introduced into the Mint several seasons ago and discarded when managers found easy ways of circumventing the regulation would be one of the features of the new Canadian League. It might be further stipulated that the new Canadian League, President Halligan still believes in the rookie rule, and if there is a new Michigan League next season and if Halligan still presides over its destinies, there will likely be found a rookie rule on the books, reinforced, hedged around with all the provisos that human ingenuity may invent to make it trick-proof.
