BARNED EN ROUTE TO NIAGARA FALLS

Londoner Wears Confident Smile As He Quits New Orleans Prison.

ARRIVES ON FRIDAY

New Orleans, La., Nov. 12.—Wearing a confident smile, Frank Bamed, alias Van Stone, left New Orleans at 12:30 p.m. on the Panama Limited on his way across the continent to Niagara Falls, Canada, where he must stand trial for the murder of Smylie Muirhead. Bamed was in charge of Inspectors Greer and Ward of the Ontario provincial force, who came here Monday night to bring him back.

Bamed waived extradition, occasioning the officers no legal difficulty. The final formal objection was removed Wednesday forenoon, when Bamed signed papers before Federal Commissioner Browne. He previously had signed similar papers for local authorities, who were holding him as a fugitive from justice.

The journey from the historic old parish prison to the Union station was made in the traditional Black Car.

Beer Scow Case Verdict Withheld

Sarnia, Nov. 12.—Magistrate Henry Gorman reserved decision yesterday afternoon in the second charge of selling liquor preferred against Harry Loughhead, export agent. The defence maintained that two special officers from Toronto arrived at the beer scow on Oct. 14 in a car bearing an American license. It was testified that they said they came from Port Huron, that they hired a boat, took two cases of ale aboard and rowed away while Loughhead was in the act of making out customs clearance papers.

Maria, Bamed, who had been kept in close confinement since his arrest because of the seriousness of the charge, seemed to particularly enjoy the atmosphere of the warm, sun-shiny day.

The prisoner was neatly attired in a well-fitting, light grey striped suit and felt hat to match. His modest brown cravat reposed on a salmon-colored silk shirt. He carried under one arm a package wrapped in newspaper which contained his effects. He had completed his toilet just before the arrival of the officers, and his countenance, although suffering somewhat from prison pallor, had a healthy tinge.

Bamed's demeanor was almost jaunty. "I am not worried," he said, just before the train departed. "My conscience is clear, and, besides, I've got one of the best lawyers in Canada to handle my case. I realize now that my one mistake was to run away. I should have remained and stood trial at once. But I lost my head and left, and after I got away it was too late to return."

He blames his wife for the charge of murder. "She must have thought I was after her," Bamed said. "But she was wrong. She knows I love her and would not harm her. The affair was an accident, an unfortunate accident, and my only offence was in leaving."

Bamed and the officers will arrive at Chicago about noon, Thursday, and expect to arrive at their Canadian destination some time Friday afternoon. They probably will go via Detroit after leaving Chicago.

Turns King's Evidence BUT GETS NO LENIENCY

Court Decides O. T. A. Violators To Receive No Sympathy For Testimony.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—That offenders against the Ontario Temperance Act who turn king's evidence to save themselves will be prosecuted here fully, was the decision given in police court, when Hal Burns, prosecuting for the provincial police, asked that the charge of transporting liquor against William McLaughlin be withdrawn as McLaughlin had given the crown splendid assistance in the prosecution against Dr. William G. E. Austin for breach of the O.T.A.

"I can't grant your request," said Magistrate Hopewell. "I will allow this charge to be withdrawn only on instructions of the attorney-general. I will lay the facts before him."

TWO RECEIVE WOUNDS IN DUEL WITH SABRES

Olympic Fencing Judge and Italian Seriously Hurt in Hour-Long Fight.

Budapest, Nov. 12.—The Italian fencer, Senor Oreste Puliti, and M. Kovacs, the Hungarian fencing judge at the Olympic games, were both seriously wounded today in an hour-long sabre duel at Nagy-Kanizsa, on the Jugo-Slav border.

The seconds of the two duellists finally stopped the fight because of the adversaries' wounds and fatigue. Senor Puliti, who was the aggressor in the duel, offered his apologies to M. Kovacs, and a reconciliation was effected while the spectators cheered.

The encounter was the result of an exchange of cards at Paris when Senor Puliti blamed M. Kovacs for his expulsion from the Olympic fencing contests.

Horse In Flames Fires Huge Barn

Winnipeg, Nov. 12.—Spreading destruction in its path a terror-stricken horse which became enveloped in flames when a lantern exploded in the barn of Howard McMahon of Dominion City, Man., dashed madly through the building, setting fire to the barn.

Fifty head of horses and cattle, together with a number of pigs, were cremated. A near building containing 30,000 bushels of oats also was badly scorched before the fire was extinguished.
