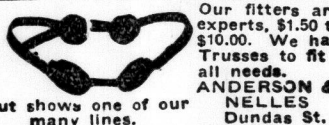

Man Uses Gun To Force Way Into United States, Is Shot In Running Fight

James Morris Felled in Battle
of Three Blocks at
Detroit.

GETS TWO BULLETS

Draws Revolver When Questioned by Immigration
Officials.

Detroit, June 18.—After a running
gun battle of three blocks today, a
man who tried to force his way into
this country by intimidating immi-
gration officers, with a pistol at
the foot of Woodward avenue, was
brought down, with two bullets at
Jefferson avenue and Bates street.
The man was taken to the receiv-
ing hospital in a serious condition.
He gave his name as James Morris,
but refused to divulge his address.
Morris was questioned, along with
other passengers, by Alfred Hayden,
United States immigration inspector,
when he landed from a Windsor
ferry.

Be Zame Insolent.

He was insolent in his answers,
and finally drew a revolver from his
pocket. Pressing it against Hayden's
body, he forced the immigration officer,
who was unarmed, to one side
while he ran through the gate and
up the street. Scores of people com-
ing off their boat scattered for cover
when they saw the flash of arms.

Hayden called for help. In re-
sponse, John Cain, another inspector,
ran out of immigration headquarters
on the dock with a rifle.

Bullets Fall.

Cain pursued Morris up Bates
street, firing his rifle as he ran. Pur-
suer and pursued ran three blocks
up the street to Jefferson avenue.
Twice Morris stopped and fired at
Cain. He did not find his mark.
Cain's rifle shots also failed.

At Jefferson avenue Patrolman
Hume of the traffic division halted
the heavy stream of traffic he was
directing and ran toward Morris, or-
dering him to halt.
Morris swore defiance, and swung
his pistol to cover Hume, but the
policeman was too quick for him. His
pistol spoke, and Morris fell to the
street, dropping his weapon. As he
fell a second bullet from Cain's
weapon struck him in the leg.

DR. BOWLEY GREEN LEAVES OCTOBER 1

Pastor's Resignation Is Ac- cepted by Talbot Street Baptist Church.

Talbot street Baptist church last
night accepted the resignation of
Rev. Bowley Green, D.D., as its
pastor, to take effect October 1. Dr.
Green leaves on that date to become
minister of Immanuel Baptist church,
Toronto.

The motion at the congregational
meeting held last night at the close
of the regular prayer meeting service,
moved by Russell Wilson and John
Douglas, expressed deep regret at
the severance of Dr. Green's connection
with the church. The motion further
evidenced the congregation's ap-
preciation of Dr. Green "as a
Christian gentleman, of his services
as pastor and of his loyalty as a
friend."

Dr. Green's resignation to the
members of the congregation was
couched in the following terms:
"In the month of April in the
year of our Lord 1922, you graciously
issued a call to me to become your
pastor. I believe that then, as I believe
now, that it was in accordance with
the Divine purpose that I should enter
into partnership with you in the
ministry of the gospel, and I gladly
accepted your invitation."

"These three brief years have been
very happy ones. Many precious
friendships have been formed which
time nor space can destroy or
diminish. Especially do I appreciate
the constant and sympathetic co-
operation of the members of the
congregation. No church has a more
sincere and devoted body of spiritual
leaders. During my stay with you
my only regret has been that I have
not rendered you and the Saviour
of us all a worthier service."

"In view of the prevailing con-
ditions, the time has come when I
must return to you the charge with
which you honored me, and therefore
I beg to resign the pastorate of the
Talbot street Baptist church, to take
effect on the first day of October,
1925."

"Praying that a man of God's own
choosing may soon be found to carry
on His work among so loyal and
loving a people."
